Bob Hoots opens services

Surely the presence of the Lord was on Trevecca's campus during the opening chapel convention, August 26, 27, and 28. Dr. Bob Hoots premiered as guest speaker. Hoots attended Trevecca forty years ago when TNC was only a high school. He was saved at the age of 12 years and preached his first sermon in Columbia, Kentucky at this same age. At the age of 19 he began pastoring in Highway, Kentucky. Former President of Trevecca, A. B. Mackey, was a layman at his church. Hoots has been serving the Lord for 30 years as an evangelist. He has preached in 1300 revivals, camps, and citywide meetings.

During the first chapel service, Hoots preached on the at-

titude of people. As more and more people began listening and responding the excitement began to grow. Hoots stated that "Jesus may remove the hurts, but He can't remove the scars. He can't take away the yesterdays but He can help you through them." Hoots also spoke in the Prayer and Praise service that Wednesday night. He stressed, "Don't reach a place where you can not hear the warning of the Lord.

Hoots had the special talent of making sure we paid attention by including several jokes in his sermons. Once, he inferred to Tammy Bakker's eyelashes. Yet, at the same time, he was preaching God's Word and getting the message across.

During the first chapel service, the Spirit that was obviously present continued throughout the week. On Thursday, Hoots claimed that we should give our best to God. He also stated, "Jesus gave His best...if you give your best you'll be okay." He went on to say that if we never feel for others with our hearts we will never make it.

To wrap the services and the week up, Hoots preached about Jesus' prayer life. He said that we should follow Christ's example as shown in Luke 24. Hoots also challenged us to expand our prayer life.

Hoots set the pace for our spiritual growth and development, now all we have to do is keep up.

SOUTHEAST ASIAN WORK GROWING

The second Southeast Asian Conference and Campmeeting of the Church of the Nazarene attracted more than 150 persons to the Central Ohio District campgrounds in Columbus, August 19-21.

Co-sponsored by the Central Ohio District and Church Extension Ministries, the conference was coordinated by Dr. J. Wilmer Lambert, Central Ohio District superintendent.

Participants came from Nazarene churches throughout the United States. Special evening speakers included: Dr. John C. Kounthapanya, pastor of Laotian United Methodist Church of Columbus; Dr. Joe Kong, head of the Cambodian Evangelical Church of the Christian and Missionary Alliance in the United States; Rev. Michael Estep, Church Extension Ministries director; and Dr. Bill Prince, Mount Vernon Nazarene College president.

Throughout the day various seminars and workshops were conducted for adult members of the Southeast Asian churches. Training sessions also held for leaders involved in sponsorship of such churches. Youth camp activities were coordinated by Kathy Kizzee from the Cleveland Westlake Cambodian Church of the Nazarene. The workshops were coordinated by Mrs. Judy Millart of Minneapolis First Cambodian Church of the Nazarene and Eileen Figge of the Gahanna, Ohio, Shepherd Church of the Nazarene.

Special activities were also held for children. Those coordinating these included: Mary Lou Roabaugh of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in Arlington, VA., and Ellie Harrie of the Columbus Northland Church of the Nazarene.

Rev. Ed Grindley, pastor of the Wilson Avenue Church in Columbus, coordinated the operation of the camp.

ARABIC WORK/THRUST GROW IN CHICAGO

The work of the Church of the Nazarene in the Arabic community in the city of Chicago continues to grow, according to a report from Rev. L. Wayne Quinn, coordinator of Multi-Cultural Ministries for the Chicago Central District and Chicago Thrust to the Cities local coordinator.

The recent third annual Arabic Campmeeting at Olivet Nazarene University attracted more than 100 persons. Dr. Jerald D. Johnson, general superintendent, addressed the group. At the close of the sessions, 27 persons had been entirely sanctified; seven persons accepted Christ.

The third Arabic Church of the Nazarene in Chicago, was begun Wednesday evening, August 19. It was planted by Rev. Suleiman Rihani at the Dalton Church in the Calumet area. The Dalton church has also donated use of the basement of its parsonage for a new Hispanic or Black church.

"Our Suburban churches are really fired up about the Thrust to Chicago," said Quinn. "I have been speaking in a lot of churches this summer, and pastors are calling our office to volunteer the use of their buildings. Some churches are financially underwriting work in urban locations."

Chicago First Church has pledged \$50,000 to locate an inner city church at 83rd and Damon, the site from which that church moved 13 years ago. Rev. Gordon Williams will head this work.

Under the leadership of Rev. Keith Bottles, Chicago Central District superintendent, the district has just purchased two Wesleyan churches and their accompanying parsonages which will be used for inner city ethnic ministry. The property, appraised at \$320,000, was purchased for only \$168,000.




Freshmen learn to have fun at mixer

Cumberland Science Museum presents kinetic coaster

After two years in construction, and eight in planning, the Cumberland Science Museum is proud to unveil the HCA Kinetic Coaster, a new, permanent exhibit designed to demonstrate the laws of physics. The HCA Foundation's donation of \$50,000 brought the coaster into existence, and it is now the largest of its type in the U.S..


The Kinetic Coaster is a system of stainless steel tracks, switches and demonstrations all suspended high about the Museum's center court. A duck pin bowling ball is cranked by the visitor to the top of the structure by a 30 foot tall auger life and is thrust into one of the three tracks to begin its journey. As the ball rolls along, it builds up enough energy to continue through a maze that demonstrates 13 concepts of physics. As Museum visitors watch the ball's journey, they have the opportunity to learn about conversation of energy, its transfer and other aspects of "physica in motion."

The bright red and stainless steel exhibit was designed by Jim Walther, Curator of Exhibits, and in addition to its educational potential, can be enjoyed as a huge kinetic sculpture. Bill Malone, Museum Physical Science Educator, guided the staff in establishing the 13 physics possibilities it demonstrates and provided the hard information for the general design of the system. The coaster was originally conceived by Bill Bradshaw, Executive Director of the Cumberland Science Museum, when he saw one similar to it in the Boston Science Museum years ago.

The HCA Kinetic Coaster can be experienced every day the Museum is open. The Cumberland Science Museum's hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 9:30 AM to 5PM and Sunday, 12:30AM to 5:30 PM. Admission is \$3 for adults and teens, \$2 for ages 3-12, and those over 65, and free for children under 3. For more information about the Museum, call 259-6099.

Management of Human Resources expands

This fall, Trevecca will inaugurate yet another degree program. Under the direction of Dr. Kenneth W. Oosting, applicants who meet certain criteria can pursue the B.S. in Management of Human Resources.

The degree in Management of Human Resources (MHR) is a new addition to Trevecca's offerings. The purpose of the MHR program is to help adults over 25 who left college after completing 64 semester credits (or will soon have 64 semester credits), who are working full-time in a variety of occupations, and who now wish to complete a college degree. The average age will be in the late 30's. The first section is scheduled to begin September 14, 1987 with another group beginning September 27.

Along with Dr. Oosting,

Rondy McBrayer and Debbie Sherwood make up the staff of MHR. Stan Sheridan is serving as a student aide.

The program is based upon adult learning theory and is thus organized in a way that adults prefer to learn. As a result, classes are scheduled sequentially, they meet at night, and much of the work is done outside of class at a time convenient to the student. Very few lectures are given, and grades are based upon what the student knows and can apply rather than what he or she can recall in a testing environment.

Spring Arbor College first developed the program, and Trevecca has adopted the curriculum.

Credit is given (up to 30 semester hours) for life learning experiences (sometimes referred to as experiential learning). People who have earned a pilot's

license, completed a professional course such as American Institute of Banking, or have other life experiences can have it converted if they can demonstrate what they have learned from these experiences.

27 semester hours are earned by completing the major. The courses take place one night each week for a year. Only one course can be taken at a time, but they are offered sequentially. Classes will be limited to 25 students, and a special emphasis will be placed on effective interpersonal communications. The two final courses will be personal and social values and managing a for profit or not for profit organization.

Each student will complete a project based upon his or her research during the coursework. The project should have practical implications for the student's work or community.

Dorm break-in comes early
