Dr. Byron To Be Commencement Speaker, June 7

Dr. Lloyd B. Byron, District Superintendent of the North Carolina District, will give the Commencement address, June 7.

Rev. Byron has superintended the North Carolina District of the Church of the Nazarene since 1952. Before that he was for more than thirty years an outstanding pastor in his denomination.

A native of Maine, Rev. Byron entered the ministry in 1919 as a circuit preacher in Indiana. Other pastorates have included Lowell, Miss.; Lansing First Church, Kankakee, Illinois.

He is a graduate of Eastern Nazarene College, and took graduate work at Boston University. He has served as president of the New England District Youth Organization, and as trustee for several of the Nazarene educational institutions.

President Mackey Challenges Seniors

Rev. Hicks Delivers Baccalaureate Address To Graduates

Rev. Lawrence B. Hicks, pastor of First Church of the Nazarene in Ashland, Kentucky, was the speaker for the Baccalaureate Service, Sunday, June 5 at 2:30 p.m.

Rev. Hicks, a native of Tennessee, will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity on Tuesday, June 7. He attended Trevecca Nazarene College and the University of the South at Sewanee, Tennessee. He served as a student pastor of the Pelham Circuit in the Methodist Church. He served three years as full-time evangelist in the Church of the Nazarene. He was pastor of Mobile, Alabama First Church, Chattanooga First Church and is now closing the fourth year as pastor at Ashland, Kentucky First Church.

Trevecca Attains Four-Year Teacher Training Status

A committee from the Tennessee State Board of Education met on Trevecca campus April 5, 1955. Their report to the Tennessee Board of Education was favorable. Mr. A. B.
