

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
## Welcome Week: ASB Social Life SLAPs TNU students

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## ITS head of operations: Roche' Terblanche

Most people on campus know that "ITS" is an acronym for Information Technology Services. As a department, our primary function is to provide network and customer support services to all students and employees at Trevecca. To provide these services, we have divided ITS operations into two groups. One group, headed by Joe Gilland, is responsible for providing all computer network and related services. The other group, headed by Scott Creel, provides desktop, help desk, and related customer support services.

### COMPUTER NETWORK

The computer network at Trevecca comprises over thirty Compaq network servers, running Microsoft NT, Windows 2000, and OpenVMS, connected to more than 500 computers and network print-

ers. We also have close to 50 Macintosh computers and 70 Citrix thin-clients on our network. We support 9 computer labs and 4 dorm labs on campus. We operate the ITS HelpDesk from 7:30 AM to 5:30 PM, Monday through Friday, and we provide Evening & Saturday Support (ESS) services for the MHR and graduate programs on campus.

The ITS department provides all network users with network accounts, e-mail mailboxes, network drive space, high-speed Internet access, remote network access (Citrix), telephone service, and voice mailboxes. In addition to providing and supporting these services, ITS supports all administrative and academic software on campus, with the exception of library application systems. Examples include all Microsoft Office applications, FrontPage, Publisher, Visio, POISE, Maple, Minitab, Perception, etc. ITS provides front-line

technical support for all computers, printers, and scanners attached to the network, and we also provide network connections in the Residence Halls and Apartments and configure student computers to access the network.

ITS is responsible for the reliable operation of all network equipment. We also work closely with the CIT department in supporting the instructional technology on campus, e.g., Smart Boards. Finally, ITS is responsible for the security of our computer network.

The ITS department offers employment opportunities for students as follows: Lab Assistants (no openings available), Desktop Technicians (no openings available), ESS Technician (1 opening available), and HelpDesk Assistants (1-2 openings available).

### FUTURE PLANS

Trevecca has 3 big projects this year. First, the current POISE

administrative software will be replaced over the next 16 months. Second, Waggoner Library will be replacing their DRA system. Third, our public web site will be redesigned and outsourced to a local vendor for hosting services. ITS will participate in varying degrees to support all these projects.

This past summer, we replaced all the Macintosh computers in the Wakefield music lab and the Mackey lab. Replacing computers in our other labs will be next on our list, subject to budget availability.

Additional summer projects included upgrading our core network equipment, removing our proxy server from the network, automating our asset inventory, migrating from one Exchange server to two separate Exchange servers (one for students and one for employees), replacing our old web server with a new server, installing

software upgrades (Maple, Minitab, Perception), performing maintenance and housekeeping tasks on our Maclib server, and implementing an Internet bandwidth management solution.

We also spent this summer working on a large project to upgrade and improve our Citrix solution on campus. I am very excited by the new Citrix technology, and I believe it will really improve efficiency and productivity both on and off campus.



The economic upswing and New York Mayor Giuliani's initiatives to revitalize Times Square transformed the once seedy portion of the city into a major tourist attraction.

While the change proved to be beneficial to the city, it sent many of the residents who actively used the ministry to other sections of the city.

By 1999, church officials were actively courting various hotel corporations for possible joint partnerships. These agreements would not only allow the church to meet inside the present facility, but also provide the necessary funds so that the

ministries could continue in needier sections of the city.

In September 2001, a hotel corporation and the church were close on striking a deal. However, the events of 9/11 and the economic fallout that proceeded would end all possible agreements.

The church, now left with a dilapidated facility but a renewed vision for compassionate ministries, is now calling on various work and witness teams for assistance in restoring the once first-class establishment to its original state. For the second year in a row a variety of Trevecca students and faculty will be spending their Fall ...Break ministering to those less fortunate in this area. Many Trevecca students would like to see this trip become an annual tradition.

"After going to New York last October following the September 11 events, our primary task was to fulfill the immediate needs of people

directly effected by the tragedy," said David Graham. "This October we will be returning, not because of any tragedy, but because we are fulfilling Christ's call to ministry; to continue to help people in need."

Current plans are underway which would allow for a maximum team of 35 to participate, 27 of which will be made up of students, the remaining spots filled by faculty, staff, and other skilled professionals. The group will be leaving campus during the evening of Thursday, October 10, with plans to return to Trevecca on Tuesday, October 15. Current cost estimates place the trip between \$125 and \$150. The price will include transportation and one meal per day.

## Trevecca volleyball team crowned tournament champions

The Lady Trojans volleyball team snatched a victory over the Brescia Lady Wildcats, winning the games 30-18, 30-25, and 30-26 in the first match of the season. After the first week was over, the Lady Trojans traveled to Livingston, Alabama for the West Alabama Tournament played on Friday and Saturday. The ladies lost the first match on Friday against West Alabama 30-20, 28-30, 27-30, but then came back later on that day to beat Millsaps College 30-21, 30-28, 30-19. On Saturday, the girls conquered Spring Hill College 30-19, 30-21, 26-30, 30-19, but cut a very close lost against Loyola University later that same day 27-30, 24-30, 30-28, 27-30.

On Labor Day, the Lady Trojans faced NCAA Division-1 opponent Tennessee State University. The games, as all volleyball matches go, are

played in a five game series with the first team to win 3 games winning the match. The Lady Trojans fell behind against TSU in the start losing 22-30, but came back in the second game to score a Trojan victory 30-22. The third game saw the Lady Trojans fighting hard only to lose by four points to put TSU ahead 2-1 in the game count.

Trying to even the games up, the Lady Trojans fought back in the fourth to win an extremely close game 35-33. In the final game, the Lady Trojans were ready to finish on top, taking the last game 15-10, and giving Trevecca the victory over TSU.

With the big NCAA Division-1 win under their belt, the Lady Trojans headed to Wilmore, Kentucky to the Asbury College Invitational for a two-day tournament. The Lady Trojans entered the tournament with high hopes, only to have them spoiled in the first round by a tough Oakland City

College squad. Oakland City, an NCAA Division-2 school, defeated the Lady Trojans 22-30, 30-28, 33-31, 30-27. Disheartened, but determined, the Lady Trojans refused to give up.

Only a few hours after the loss, the volleyball team took the court again, this time dominating Campbellsville University 30-21, 30-20, 30-21. As the first day of the Asbury College Invitational came to a close, the Lady Trojans sat near the middle of the rankings with a 1-1 record.

In day two of the Asbury College Invitational the Trevecca volleyball team came out on fire. Forgetting their early first round loss only a day before, the Lady Trojans made quick work of Tennessee Temple in the quarter-finals 30-21, 30-19, 30-20. The semi-finals also went quickly with Trevecca defeating Cumberland University 30-19, 30-28, 30-14.

Having played 4 matches in two days, the Lady Trojans

entered the championship game of the Asbury College Invitational tired but still determined. Facing the Lady Trojans in the finals was the team who had defeated them in the first round of the tournament only a day before, Oakland City College.

The Lady Trojans, undaunted by their earlier defeat, swept the first three games, pounding Oakland City 30-17, 30-26, 33-31 to claim the Asbury College Invitational Championship.

After the final match, freshman Laurel Markovich and junior Katie Carter were named to the All-Tournament team while junior Crissie Cunha was named Tournament MVP. The Lady Trojans are now 8-3 on the season and look to improve on that record Saturday, September 14 when they face Georgetown at home. The game starts at 3pm and will be in Moore Gymnasium on the campus of Trevecca.


