Vienna Choir Boys to visit Trevecca

For approximately the past five hundred years, the Vienna Choir Boys have been touring the world as one of the most respected musical groups in history.

Now, on Thursday, January 23rd, 2003, Trevecca Community Church has the honor of hosting this world-renowned group.

Half a millennium ago, upon the transfer of his court from Innsbruck to Vienna, Hapsburg Emperor Maximilian I demanded that there always be six boys among his personal court musicians. Historians have since settled on the year 1498 as the official founding date of the group the world has come to know simply as the Vienna Choir Boys.

For the next four hundred years, the boys were commissioned to sing exclusively for the Hapsburg dynasty's court at events such as masses, private concerts, and other state occasions.

After the breakdown of the Hapsburg Empire in 1918, the boys' choir survived because of the work of Dean of the Imperial Chapel, Josef Schnitt.

In its entirety, the choir consists of about one hundred choristers between the ages of ten and fourteen.

This group is then divided into four touring choirs, one of whom Trevecca will be pleased to present this Thursday.

The Vienna Choir Boys sings primarily on the continent of Europe, however they are frequent guests in Asia and Australia, as well





Lady Trojans perfect at home

Dating back to last season, the Trevecca women's basketball team has won 12 games in a row at home. The confines of Moore Gymnasium on the campus of Trevecca have proven to be an uninviting place to play for opponents with its surrounding bleachers and intimidating home crowd.

As impressive as Moore Gymnasium may be, the Lady Trojans have had to earn their success this season on the road. Almost two months have elapsed since the Trevecca women's squad has played a home game.

After chalking up home wins against several top NAIA schools in the first half of the season including a huge, three point upset of #1 ranked Southern Nazarene Univeristy, the Lady Trojans embarked on a six game road trip which was extended to seven games after the home game against Cumberland University was postponed due to heavy snowfall.

After suffering a loss from TranSouth Conference opponent Lyon College, the

Trevecca women's basketball team bounced back with a win against Martin Methodist College on Saturday evening in Trevecca's final game of their extended road trip. The game began as a defensive battle as both teams struggled shooting from the field early on. The Lady Trojans only shot 25.7% from the field in the first half, but thanks to their defense, Trevecca went into the locker room at half time deadlocked in a 28-28 tie.

In the second half, Trevecca found their rhythm once more as junior Lindsey Fly dropped in 21 points and 11 rebounds to lead the Lady Trojans to a 67-61 victory. Fly's stats were good enough for her 8th double-double of the season. Senior Jennifer Wilson added 17 points and was a perfect 4 for 4 from the free throw line while freshman Kristin Scoggins tallied 7 points and 4 steals

in the winning effort.

The Lady Trojans improved to 14-2 on the season and 1-1 in TranSouth Conference play. Trevecca will next travel to Jackson, TN to face #2 Union University on Thursday, Jan 23 at 6pm.

Trevecca will finally return home to defend their 12 game home winning streak on Saturday, January 25 at noon against Freed-Hardeman University.

Someone forgot to tell the Trojans they were supposed to lose.


