# THE PRIMACY OF JESUS CHRIST

ESUS CHRIST was, in the period of His minority, a builder. But His material was not stone; it was not even the sun dried brick; it was but perishing wood, for He was but "Jesus the Carpenter." And there remains not a single house which He built. There is not even a piece of furniture or an ox yoke which remains to testify to His work as an artisan. But He remains "Jesus the Carpenter," for all of that; for He calls to Himself all those who are weary and heavy laden and fits to their necks His yoke of love and thus gives them relief and comfort and rest; He provides for the equipment of the saint so that "The man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto every good work;" and He has gone on to the Father's House to build mansions for His own. He is the supreme carpenter and builder of all time.

Jesus Christ was a writer. His finger was His pen and the shifting sand His parchment, and even the words which He inscribed are not known. But He now writes with the stylus of His Spirit upon the fleshy tables of the hearts of believers, and His subject is His own wonderful love. And for all that the stylus is so flexible and the parchment so frail, the writing remains through storm and sickness, through sorrow and care, and becomes brighter and more indelible with the passing years. "E'en down to old age all my people shall prove My sovereign, eternal, unchangeable love." Jesus is the Dean of the writers of all the ages.

A sentimentalist complains that men have built monuments to the memory of their great, and have uncovered their heads at the graves of their sages, but that they have overlooked the greatest and wisest of them all. For no formal monument has been erected to Jesus Christ and the exact location of His grave is not precisely known. But the answer to this is that men build monuments for those who are dead, and Jesus Christ is not dead. He was dead once, but now He is alive forever more. And men visit graves because the ashes of those they revere rest there. But the body of Jesus Christ did not see corruption. The earth never was able to claim His flesh as dust. But every Christian church, every Christian home, and every Christian life is a monument to the spotless living and high priestly dying of Jesus Christ, and the sacrament of the Lord's Supper is a better testimonial to the historicity of its Author than all the masonry of Pharaoh could be. Jesus Christ is the supreme notable of all history.

The great of this world have sometimes estimated their dignity and standing in terms of their rich's and their jewels. But when the mother of the Gracci was taunted for her lack of jewels, she presented her two sons and said, "These are my jewels." "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon his name. And they shall be mine, saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels." The bloodwashed saints of the ages are the jewels of Jesus Christ, and judged by their number and preciousness, He is indeed "Heir of the ages," for riches, and "My beloved Son" for dignity.

And thus, while He despised the shame which the world heaped upon Him, and took no account of men's ideas of dignity and permanence, adopting the position of servant and working in the most perishable elements, as estimated by men, He has been given a name "Which is above every name." And He has also shown us the road to a glorious immortality by the example which He has given.

# CAN PEOPLE BE SAVED WITHOUT MORALITY?

PERHAPS some will think we are misquoted in our caption, and that we actually mean to ask if people can be saved without spirituality. But no, we mean morality—just plain, old fashioned honesty, veracity and purity. In other words, is there any reality in the Christianity of people who lie, steal, drink liquor, gamble and commit adultery?

And here is what started us on this line of thinking: we were in Lexington, Kentucky, a week ago and were shown the church which the race horse people built for a preacher who worked to have the state antigambling laws repealed. Today we were looking over a New York paper and found an item which said that a certain chapel was filled from early morning until noon with "Catholics from practically every stage in New York, who came for the closing of the mission which has been in progress for two weeks." everywhere we turn there seems to be indications that thugs and bandits and criminals and bootleggers and anarchists and gamblers and divorcees and people of every walk and calling of life high and low, good and bad, have their churches just like they have their lodges and political parties. And we just can't keep from wondering whether people think there is any thing at all to that religious profession which does not save one from immorality and outbroken wickedness.

We do not mean to indicate that we think morality will save, but we do say that grace that will save the soul from death and damnation will certainly save the life from sin and wickedness.

We used to think the story about the man who defended the church member who was being tried with a view to expulsion, even though he had to admit that the accused was "a little quarrelsome when he was drinking," was a parody; but now we wonder if it was not true, since men seem to find no difficulty in professing religion in spite of their deeds of dishonesty, their words of falsehood and lascivious actions.

But we would not call attention to the Roman Catholics and Episcopalians, and thereby divert it from ourselves. For there is a strange antinomianism which permits the profession of the highest state of grace and engagement in the noble task of spreading scriptural holiness on the part of some who wink at falsehood, dishonesty and impurity. But without regard to church membership or profession, there simply is no reality in the religion of that professor who finds no ability to live the life. This is no place for camouflaging, "He that committeth sin is of the devil." Nothing that "defileth or maketh a lie" can enter heaven. And all the religion in the world which can exist divorced from true morality is false and its professors are hypocrites. Talent and reputation and riches and influence—every human power and possession—cannot substitute for plain, old-fashioned goodness, which is a fruit and a foundation for New Testament religion.

### "WHAT IS HOLINESS?"

We are not thinking so much of the definition of holiness as of its characteristics. And we have not seen a better putting of both the negative and positive phases from this point of view than the following, from Messiah's Advocate:

To hear and see some, we would easily conclude that holiness is a state of rapture, ecstasy, or hilarious sentimentalism. With others it seems to be a twitch of some unruly nerves! With others it is a babbling tongue, running on, incessantly, as Longfellow's "brook," which may be understood and not, just as the case may develop. Yet, some say holiness is a sweet, wonderful heavenly influence in which we are bathed, and the bath is heavy or light, just as the feelings run. Others put up a brand of holiness as a great rich blessing from God, that we may tuck away at will in the east corner of the heart, upon which we may feast, exult in, trust in and worship in.

But, what says God? Holiness is rugged and rock-ribbed. There is nothing evanescent about it. It isn't puny. It isn't the thing that is hidden away in convents or monasteries, lonely caves or in some lonely spot, in order that it may live!

Holiness is intensely practical. Its first manifestation is that it is at deadly grips with sin. It matters not whether that is ecclesiastical sin garbed in up-to-date sentimentality, or in the robes of a stern priest. It is an experience. It is a life. It is an energy. It expresses itself in "all holy conversation" (manner of living). Being partakers of God's holiness (Heb. 12:10), holiness is a divine something that sways the affections, and holds in beautiful grip all the slants of a mortal man.

"Therefore holiness is the divine life implanted within us. It is not something acquired by our own efforts, be they ever so great, rigid, and prolonged. Consequently, holiness is not the result of penance, culture, or human wisdom. Holiness consists in being made pure in heart and life by divine power alone. It is having God's moral image. If we speak of the special agents or instrumentalities as affecting our holiness, we may mention, as the chief, the Word of God, the blood of Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. And constant faith in Jesus makes holiness abide.

"Real Bible holiness, then, being the life of God within the soul, must of necessity find expression in holy activity for the good of man and the glory of God. Let us beware, therefore, of so-called 'passive' holiness, lest real holiness go out at the point of sluggishness and indolence! Let us remember the holy, ceaseless activity of Jesus. He 'went about doing good' amid the busy scenes, the jostling throngs and the moral impurities around him. It becomes us to follow in his footsteps.

"It is also true that genuine holiness is courageous and bold, but not impudently audacious. It rebukes sin without fear or favor, but, withal, seeks to do it wisely. It is a terror to evil-doers. It cannot be intimidated, suppressed or bribed. If need be, it presses to the very mouth of hell, if thereby it may snatch a soul from the awful burnings.

"In short, real holiness lives, shines, and burns for God. It is 'the light of the world' and the 'salt of the earth.' Have we this kind of holiness? All other is spurious and will not stand the test to which true Bible holiness is always more or less subjected."

#### THE BLOT OF MOB MURDER

The recent annual report shows that thirty persons were lynched by mobs during 1926. This was thirteen more than in 1925 and 14 more than in 1924. These lynchings occurred in ten states, which is the same number as in 1925 and one more than in 1923.

The Federal Council of Churches publishes an "Honor Roll," showing the states which are free from lynching. The report gives classified groups covering periods of years. Massachusets, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont, four states, never had a lynching. Connecticut, Maine and New Jersey have had no lynchings since 1886. Delaware, Michigan, Wisconsin and Nevada have had no lynchings during the past twenty years. Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Maryland and South Dakota, have had no lynchings during the past fifteen years. New York, North Dakota, Oregon and Pennsylvania, have had none for ten years. Arizona, California, Colorado, Kansas, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Carolina, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming, have had none in five years. Oklahoma and Illinois have had none in two years. And Alabama, Louisiana, Missouri, Ohio and Utah had none during 1926.

Mob violence is a testimony to the fanaticism of the people always, and sometimes it is also a witness to the cowardice and inefficiency of the officers of the law. But in all cases it is a blot upon the very name of civilization and is a disgrace to the community, county, state and nation in which it occurs. May the other ten states join the lynchless thirty-eight during 1927!

## FOR NAZARENE FLOOD VICTIMS

We have been reading the reports of the flood situation along the Mississippi, every day. But our interest has been general and the situation has seemed to us to be so vast that we had not thought there was any thing much we could do. The calls are for millions and millions are needed and we trust shall be given.

But this morning we received the following telegram from Rev. Howard Eckel, pastor First Church of the Nazarene, Miami, Florida:

First Church, Miami, will give one hundred dollars toward a fund for flood sufferers, to be distributed among our own people, many of whom must be in want.

This waked us up, and immediately we had visions of Nazarenes whose homes are flooded and whose prospects for a crop this year grow dimmer every day, and we began to feel that, after all, there is something close and personal about this matter. General Superintendent Reynolds received a letter from District Superintendent Oliver of Arkansas, yesterday, in which he said he has never seen so much water and that there is much distress among our people.

Of course no canvass of the situation among our people is possible yet, but General Treasurer Lunn says he has had other remittances for the relief work in the flooded section, and by these and the noble example of First Church, Miami, we know that our people will respond to the needs of their brethren.

Our General Treasurer will receive offerings for the purpose mentioned and will distribute the money thus received, as our usual custom is, upon the advice of our District Superintendents in the fields affected. ## "HOW IT STRIKES US"

In the issue of March 15, The Way of Faith, Columbia, S. C., contained a pertinent editorial which we quote in full because we cannot think of any way in which to better say what we ourselves think of such matters. The lines are so definitely drawn now days that no one can be blamed for thinking that any man or body of men that becomes concerned with the defense of "the proper teaching of scientific subjects in American schools and colleges" is either already sold out to Modernism or else is cringing before the claims to superior intelligence which these arrogant skeptics unblushing make. The editorial under the heading, "How it strikes us," is as follows:

At the recent meeting of the Educational Association of the M. E. Church, South, in Memphis, Tenn., the following resolutions were passed, introduced by Dr. Few of Duke University and signed by thirteen members of the Association:

"We, the members of the Educational Association of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in session at Memphis, Tennessee, February 10, 1927, hereby put ourselves on record as opposed to all legislation that would interfere with the proper teaching of scientific subjects in American schools and colleges.

"Whether or not we have been in position to form opinions on current scientific theories or whatever opinions we may have formed on these subjects, in any case, we are opposed to legislation, because we believe it will be futile and can serve no good purpose."

First, it strikes us such resolutions can serve no good purpose. Second, no one we have ever heard of is opposed to the proper teaching of scientific subjects.

Third, the aim as expressed privately by Dr. Few was to do what little the Association could towards expressing an opinion, since Arkansas and several other Southern States seemed to be weakening. These States referred to have discussed laws prohibiting the teaching of evolution in tax-supported schools and colleges.

Fourth, these educators represent religious educational institutions, and it seems they have gone out of their way to meddle with what concerns or affects State institutions.

Fifth, the resolutions are so indefinite that they reflect on the

clarity of the teaching and teachers from which they emanate. What the church had a right to expect if these leaders said anything, would be to define the scientific subjects aimed at, and what is meant by "proper teaching" of such.

Sixth, the secular pros understood them better and called the resolutions "an une pected slap dealt anti-evolution legislation."

Seventh, it looks like going beyond the efforts or interests of teachers in tax-supported institutions who might be most intimately concerned. The church which these educators represent and from which they get their office and support has not spoken on this subject.

Eighth, the resolutions take pains to say the members of the Association are not all in position to form opinions on current scientific theories. Nevertheless, they are willing to oppose such legislation. Here first they call what they are resoluting against theories. These are very different from facts. Dr. James H. Kirkland, discussing the limits of evolution in a book reviewed in these columns recently says, "The facts supporting the theory of evolution are in the field of science, and only scientists can judge them. On the other hand, the interpretation of these facts is in the field of philosophy, and will be interpreted according to the philosophic bias of the critic. Hence, to some the theory of evolution is an aid to faith; to others it is an excuse for agnosticism, and to others still the basis of pure materialism." Now the wonder is, to which of these three classes the members of this Association belong. Perhaps a resolution at the next meeting may declare.

## **EDITORIAL COMMENTS**

The practical unity of the church, local and general, is very desirable. Therefore we must use great caution in the matter of organizing any thing in such a way that it does not head up in the regularly constituted order of things. This applies to the Sunday school, the Young People's Society, the Missionary Societies and to every other auxiliary. The Church of the Nazarene is one church and we must guard its practical as well as its doctrinal unity. It is better that the pastor be the head of every local organization and that every District and General organization head up in the District and General Assemblies and in the District and General officers.

The editor has received no less than half a dozen letters within the week asking for an explanation of Revelation 13 concerning the beast and his mark and the "number of his name," the mystical 666, etc. One man wants me to tell "precisely" who and what the beast is and what his mark, etc. Now to begin with, I do not believe the Pope is the beast and I do not think there is any special reference to Catholicism in the passage. In fact I think there is no exact reference to anyone or any thing now present in the world. The Beast is the Antichrist and he has not yet been revealed and will not be fully made known until after Jesus Christ comes back to the earth to receive His glorified Church. As to the mystical number, I think Seiss was striking at the truth when he said, "Six is the bad number, and when multiplied by tens and hundreds, it denoted evil in its greatest intensity and most disastrous manifestation. This number of the Beast's name thus gives his standing in the estimate of Heaven, and fixes attention on that rather than on the numerical spelling of the name he bears on earth. If we can only know the principles pertaining to his badness; if we can only have understanding to detect his spirit which already works so powerfully in so many specious forms about us, we shall have accomplished the most needful reckoning of the number of his name. And without this, we shall be carrying his damning 'mark' upon our souls, even whilst we think ourselves forearmed against his power by what we have discovered of the word by which his contemporaries designate him. The moral insight into his nature is the wisdom we require, rather than the orthography of the name by which he is called." In simple words, the principal thing is to get truly right with God, get sanctified wholly, and to live an "other-worldlike" life at all times. This will keep us out of the clutches of the devil in the present age. And in that age when the Beast, the Antichrist, is revealed and reigning upon earth, we shall be celebrating the nuptials between the Lamb and His Bride in the banqueting halls of heaven.

A Sunday school teacher says, "A young man in our class argues that one cannot forgive another except the trespasser first ask forgiveness. What do you think of this?" I believe the young man is right, with this qualification, one should have at all times a forgiving spirit and a willingness to forgive. Anger, wrath, and desire for revenge are all condemned and forbidden by the Bible, and what God commands in His law He provides in His grace. But you know Paul asked prayer that he might be delivered from "unreasonable men." There are indeed some men with whom it is not possible to live peaceably. Concerning such, Paul said, "As much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men." But it is the spirit and temper which count with God. So the Christian who is willing to forgive is accredited with forgiving, and such an one finds mercy with God.

The experience of Saul, Samuel and the witch of Endor troubles many people in these days when spiritism is being revived. But to me, either of two explanations is satisfactory: First, Samuel did appear by special providence of God, and his appearing was a judgment upon the wicked king and a surprise to the witch, whose usual fakish claims were over-shadowed by this unexpected divine intervention. Or second, this was just another unfounded claim of the witch to which the troubled heart of the king gave credence. I think nine-tenths of the experiences of spiritism can be explained upon the basis of psychology, including telepathy, and whatever is not human about it is directly of the devil.

When doubt and faith present themselves and their claims before you, doubt your doubts and believe your faith and you will win.

# THE DANGER OF SUBSTITUTING FOR THE SUPERNATURAL IN REVIVAL MEETINGS

▼ HE late Levi White of Indianapolis, wrote a very useful book called "The Borderland of the Supernatural." A somewhat extensive study of Psychology has convinced the writer that the value of such study is comparatively small and of little help to the spiritual life. However it has perhaps made us suspicious that much that passes for great spiritual power is, in reality, only the effect of human manipulation, or what psychologists would call suggestion. How far the power of personal magnetism, and what is called mob psychology, may be legitimately used in the conduct of revival meetings is a question that should demand a more thorough discussion than we have room for in this article. However, that it should ever be substituted for, or used under a pretense of being divine power, certainly needs no discussion with people of common honesty.

The knowledge of mob psychology and its use in revival meetings under a pretense of and as a substitute for real spiritual power have been the ruination of the life and usefulness of many who otherwise might have been eminently successful. The writer was personally acquainted with a man that was almost invariably successful in revival meetings (I mean so far as could be observed). He would line his pockets with greenbacks where other evangelists would starve; and he and his friends attributed all this to a special anointing. Yet this man later acknowledged that during all this time he was living in the grossest immorality. I knew one man who created a furore and started a revival where hundreds became seekers, simply by sending the people from the church in funeral tread while the sexton tolled the bell. Another who accomplished the same result by burning the church records. Both of these men were striking personalities. And, strange to say, both were criminals and were in the toils of civil courts within six months after the aforesaid marvelous accomplishments. Now what was the secret of their success. Some would perhaps say they retained the Spirit's enduement after the Spirit Himself had been grieved from their hearts. No, we have no scriptural proof. And I cannot believe that the Spirit co-operates with a wicked deceitful man in spiritual accomplishments.

Alexander the Great, Napoleon Bonaparte, or Peter the Hermit (who enthused the multitudes until they cried "Give us crosses, give us crosses," and without armor, or sufficient clothing, or food, they marched to their deaths in a futile attempt to rescue the tomb of Christ from the possession of the Moslem hordes), John Alexander Dowie (who understood the secret of creating a frenzy that would cause laborers and washwomen to lay their savings at his feet, hard-headed

farmers to sell their farms, bankers their banks, and merchants their merchandise to support him in luxury), and I might refer to more recent examples of the same thing; all of these may have been ignorant of modern psychology, but all of them understood mob psychology and worked it to the limit. And any man who understands mob psychology, unless he has an incorruptible character and is very deeply consecrated to God, is a dangerous member of society and likely will work his own ruin as well. I am convinced that most of us live way below our privilege in the matter of divine healing, and yet to attract crowds by advertising divine healing meetings (which of course means indirectly ourselves as especially gifted in that art) is to my mind a very dangerous method of procedure. While some, whose faith is simple and direct are healed, the great mass who profess healing soon drift back to their old diseases and appliances, which only proves that their healing was the suggestion of the manipulator. Of course it is said that their faith wavered, but when people are told that they must retain a certain frame of mind in order to retain healing, these manipulators are unconsciously using suggestions instead of faith. No, one divinely healed does not have to manipulate to retain it any more than a man recovered from typhoid has to keep up a constant struggle to keep from relapsing into that disease. Any man with a strong personality, organizing ability, pleasing manner of address and a fair knowledge of the Bible, who will tell pleasing and entertaining stories until he has captivated the crowd, then gives them some Bible truths without putting the standard up where they see clearly that it means a positive break with the world, then uses pathos and touching incidents until they are subdued and tender, and finally appeals to the heroic. can get seekers, even create a furore, and have what ordinarily passes for a great revival.

Now why is not the foregoing perfectly legitimate and right? Our reply is that some of the aforesaid is perfectly legitimate and right, unless it is used as a substitute for the supernatural power of the Holy Ghost. As a substitute it is all the merest refuse and folly, and will curse rather than bless the church and the world. God is very particular about integrity, very jealous of motives. God's priests were not to wear a rough garment to deceive. The anointing oil was to be very carefully compounded and carefully applied. Anyone not authorized compounding any substitute for it was to be cut off. Anointing oil was always used to prepare for official position, and was typical of the power and unction of the Holy Spirit, without which ministers are not to enter upon their divinely appointed commission (See Acts 1:4 and 8).

And there is absolutely no substitute for this. To substitute personality, human enthusiasm, wrought up emotionalism, leadership, or mob psychology, is to be guilty of the crime of grieving the Holy Ghost. "Behold, all ye that kindle a fire, that compass yourselves about with sparks; walk in the light of your fire, and in the sparks that ye have kindled. This shall ye have of mine hand. Ye shall lie down in sorrow." Almost every evangelist and worker of my acquaintance is puzzled to know how to get the seekers through at the altar. Well, the altar service is, and must be, a battleground where Satan makes a desperate stand to defeat souls who are on the verge of victory. And there is entirely too much tendency to talk about things that would be regarded as discourteous and entirely out of place during the time of preaching. All this is distracting to workers and disturbing to seekers. On the other hand the great lack at our altars seems to be a lack of deep thorough conviction. But if there is a lack of the unction and power in the preaching, if we have substituted human manipulation for the heavenly dynamite, then we must continue this manipulation at the altar and on into church membership, Soon we have filled the church with people who may profess a high state of grace, but are in reality worldlings that no amount of skill on the part of a pastor can ever train for soul-saving campaigns or restrain from worldliness. And this is the process by which many churches have become floating or sinking derelicts, when God intended them to be soul-saving crews on the storm-swept seas of this old world.

# Astonishing Spiritual Phenomena Manifested in Individuals and Early Revivals

Can the Modern Church have such Holy Ghost Outpourings today?

## Article Seven

He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and fire (Matt. 3:11).

Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you (Acts 1:8).

Be filled with the Spirit (Eph. 5:18).

And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost (Acts 1.4)

WILL now relate some remarkable experiences that have come under my own observation during the past thirty-five years. I have witnessed some astonishing displays of God's power during revival meetings. Perhaps, just as great displays of Holy Ghost power as any of the fathers ever saw. These supernatural phenomena came about, as the result of long and continued prayer. Prayer not only moves God, but it moves men to seek God. While in the evangelistic field for a number of years, I invariably drove the people to prayer until there were great heartsearching and heart-agony. In doing so, I was impelled to pray myself. Thursday of each week was always set apart as a day of fasting and prayer. Then, in addition, I introduced a prayermeeting of just one hour between nine and ten a. m. each day at the church. This meeting I labeled, "The Power House" of the revival. This hour, was not for anything but prayer. In not a few cases, this prayermeeting became a cyclone center of Holy Ghost activity. It was indeed a Spiritual Power House. In addition to this and all other forms of praying, I would ask the people to stop perfectly still wherever they were, on the street, in their homes or business places, for two minutes to be spent in prayer. The signal for this unusual activity was the blowing of the whistle or the ringing of the church bell at 12 m.

When the church gets down to business, and becomes

pliably reckless, interceding with God, results are sure to follow. A revival of any lasting spiritual dimensions cannot be "worked up," or "advertised up," but must be prayed down. A revival that God gives in answer to prayer, is bound to result in lasting benefits to the church and community.

At Zanesville, Ohio, during the months of May and June, 1901, a "siege" revival meeting was held, Cornell and English were the evangelists. The meeting was a union meeting of the five Methodist churches of the city and ran day and night for five consecutive weeks. It was conservatively estimated that fully one thousand different persons were at the mourner's bench seeking either regeneration or entire sanctification. About three hundred persons claimed to be wholly sanctified as a second work of grace. A thousand persons attended a single day of prayer and fasting. The Holy Spirit was poured out without measure, there was no preaching but mighty, agonizing prayer lasting six hours or more. There were three spontaneous altar services, the people making their way to the altar without an invitation. They would "pray through" and go shouting down the aisles of the church until there was a sound as of a mighty rushing wind. More than one hundred persons were either converted or sanctified that day. As a result of this revival, a large number united with the Methodist churches.

At a campmeeting held at Normal, Ill., near Bloomington, the called workers were Rev. I. G. Martin and the writer. The people were led to persist in importunate prayer, the very heavens were opened and copious showers of blessing fell on the camp. Hundreds were seekers of salvation and scores claimed the victory. Among the number a brilliant and beautiful

young woman who fairly took the camp by storm. She got both the shouting and laughing blessing. When she would laugh her face seemed as radiant as the face of an angel. Her ecstasy lasted several hours. She became so attractive under the power of God that hundreds looked upon her in amazement; men and boys climbed trees where they could get a better view. It was a scene never to be forgotten. 'It was at this campmeeting that I saw a genuine case of the "jerks." A young man with his lady friend sat in the audience when all of a sudden he began to shake like an aspen leaf; he tried to steady himself by holding on to the seat where they were sitting, but that would not do. He seized the seat in front of him, but jerked so terribly that he shook everything around him. He finally managed to get to his feet and staggered to the mourner's bench, his lady friend soon following. Both were powerfully converted.

At the Wichita, Kans., campmeeting twenty or twenty-five years ago, the called workers were Dr. C. J. Fowler, Rev. C. W. Ruth and the writer. The whole camp was led to pray; there was scarcely any visiting, but mighty praying everywhere. Great crowds hung upon the Word and five hundred or more were earnest seekers of salvation in ten days. Large numbers at the altar prayed through to personal victory. The last Sunday afternoon the Holy Spirit fell upon the people and the great audience of two or three thousand persons were deeply sensible of the mighty power of God. It was estimated that from 75 to 100 persons "struck oil" and were happily converted or gloriously sanctified, while scores of others did not make the landing. The memorable scene of the sweep of God over this camp beggars description. With hundreds of people laughing, rejoicing, singing, pleading groaning and crying, they made noise enough to be heard a mile. God was there, and when He comes on the scene there is always some commotion.

At the Pasadena campmeeting held in 1912, the Rev. Seth C. Rees and the writer were the preachers. There were three long avenues with tents on either side, the avenues electric lighted. The camp had all modern conveniences. Early in the camp a remarkable spirit of prayer was upon the people. Praying everywhere, tents, group prayermeetings, praying in the woods, and public praying all combined made a healthy revival atmosphere. The Holy Spirit was especially present to convict, convert and sanctify. While Brother Rees was preaching one forenoon, suddenly, the heavenly breezes began to blow and soon there was a veritable cyclone of Holy Ghost power that swept everything before it. Scores were blessed nearly to death, and many ran to the altar of prayer and were not long finding salvation. More than five hundred persons were seekers in the ten days, and scores got through "good." Many are still enjoying salvation today as a result of that God-honored campmeeting. Those who were privileged to attend this memorable campmeeting will never forget it.

A number of years ago, I was called to hold a revival meeting in Kingsley Methodist Episcopal church, Evansville, Ind. From the inception of the meeting the spiritual tide began to rise, and it was clearly apparent that we would have a freshet if not a flood. At the end of the first week the church was jammed to the doors and soon the little church would not hold the people who desired to attend the revival.

The preacher, Rev. Reynolds, and I attended the monthly union preacher's meeting. The preachers were discussing the advisability of calling an evangelist to the city for a union meeting of all the churches. We told them that we had a good revival started already, and if they would join with us and furnish a larger building to hold the crowd, we thought a wide spread revival would be the result. They treated the proposition with silence, if not silent contempt. They evidently knew I was preaching holiness as a second work of grace, which was meat too strong for them to digest. But God has a way of working when His children are obedient to His voice.

The little Methodist church would not hold the people, so that it became necessary to secure a larger building. The only available building was Evans Hall, seating—as I remember—about 2000 people. The rent was \$11 a night. This staggered the faith and ability of the little Methodist church, so I assumed the expense myself, beside about \$75 for advertising We were to have a great meeting at Evans Hall on Thursday night. The night came and proved to be extremely stormy; the wind blew and the rain came down in torrents, it looked very much like defeat. I pressed my way through the storm to the Hall, and to my surprise found about 600 people; they looked like a small bunch in a hall with a seating capacity of about 2000. We had a splendid revival meeting that night with numbers seeking the Lord. In the hall that night-as strange as it may seem-was "Madam Martha," an old dive-keeper, who had run a bawdy house in that city for 17 years. Why, she and her husband, came to the revival meeting through that awful storm, God alone knows. But she was there and one of our workers—Brother Cody—approached her, greeted her cheerfully and invited her to come to the revival meeting at the church next night. Sure enough, she was there and when I made the altar call she made her way to the mourner's bench and fell in a heap on the floor. She stretched out on her back. I rallied the people for prayer and we bombarded the skies for this woman's conversion for two hours and ten minutes or until after midnight. She lay there on her back groaning and crying and praying all this time. All of a sudden she managed to get to her feet and shouted that God for Christ's sake had saved her. The church was full of people who joined her shout of triumph; it was a wonderful scene. A reporter happened to be present and he wrote a long story about the miraculous conversion of "Madam Martha," which appeared in the morning paper. We hired Evans Hall again for Sunday night and I advertised that "Madam Martha" would relate her experience. She was a well known character who had been in police court many times. She had the reputation of being vicious and wicked.

Sunday night came and Evans Hall was crowded to the doors. I introduced the Madam, and when she stood to speak, a silence that could be felt pervaded the hall. Her first sentence almost caused the hearts of some to stop beating, she said: "I see many men here tonight that I have seen before." She then told how for seventeen years she had lived a wicked life and often wished she could give up her hellish business. "But," said she, "I am a converted woman and from this on, with the help of God, I expect to live a Christian life. I am going to make my house a house of prayer." She was faithful in carrying out her resolve.

A thousand people came to her house on Saturday night to see me "clean up" the place. I broke the beer, wine and champagne bottles and poured the stuff into the gutters. I made a bonfire of cards, obscene literature, indecent pictures and fortune telling paraphernalia. I climbed on the window-sill of the house, and exhorted the crowd to flee from the wrath to come. Her conversion caused a sensation throughout the city and from that on we had no trouble about crowds. We had more people than we could care for. I kept in touch with "Madam Martha" by correspondence, for a number of years, encouraging her to remain faithful. The devil tried in every way possible to wreck her faith and cause her to give up her hope, but she persevered and held on. A few-years ago God took her home. I am convinced that she made the City.

For the past fifty years, the holiness movement has been moving. Thousands of successful revivals have been held where God manifested His power to save, sanctify and heal. Hundreds of holiness campmeetings have sprung up where literally thousands have been gloriously saved and definitely sanctified. Many of these have gone "Sweeping through the gates, Washed in the Blood of the Lamb." There have been wonderful scenes of God's amazing power and grace. Just as marked as the days of Benjamin Abbott or Peter Cartwright. Churches, nowadays, can have just such revivals if they are willing to forsake all forms of world-liness and will pay the price in prayer and holy devotion.

This closes the seven articles on "Astonishing Spiritual Phenomena." I trust the hearts of a multitude have been inspired as they have read and contemplated the miraculous outpourings of the Holy Spirit upon the hearts of individuals. He is just the same today.

# SAVING OUR CHILDREN TO THE CHURCH

R ECENTLY the pastor of one of the leading churches in our connection, made, from the pulpit, the statement that only eleven children under the age of fifteen years were members of his church. The church of which he is pastor, and to which he was preaching, has a membership of about three hundred and a Sunday school of about four hundred members.

I am of the opinion that a canvass of our entire connection would reveal the same astonishing condition prevailing everywhere. For every effect there is a corresponding cause. I believe the cause of this appalling condition can be expressed in one word-NEG-LECT. The neglected child of today will be the social outcast of tomorrow. Neglect the proper spiritual development and training of the child of today, and we will go on the rocks, as a church, tomorrow. The greatest problem that faces the Church of the Nazarene today is not the budget system and the carrying out of our well regulated plans and programs. Our greatest problem (Perhaps I should say one of our greatest problems, and yet I almost feel like asking God to forgive me if I should modify it), is the saving of our children to God and the church.

Just what are we doing to bring this to pass? Many of our children are sent to Sunday school, to spend the hour with a teacher who is incompetent, who has made little or no study of the lesson or of the needs of the child, and who feels no burden for the salvation of his soul. He fills the place merely because he was elected to it. The parents gather at eleven o'clock to get their souls fed and their hearts blest with the message of the hour, which must be suited to their needs. But where are the children who left our church doors at the end of Sunday school? Very few are seen at the church or preaching service. God only knows where they go. Many of them go back to homes which are darkened by sin. Others go to the streets and public playgrounds. We do not see many of them again until the next Sunday morning. Why are they absent from our services? We do not give them a message suited to their age, one that grips their hearts. In their early 'teens, they begin to look out upon worldly things with a degree of satisfaction. The Sunday school grows even less attractive to them, and, if not forced to attend, they begin to absent themselves at about the age of fifteen, and by the time they reach eighteen years of age the majority of them are seldom found at the Sunday school and are practically lost to the church. In many instances this is the case with children from our best Nazarene homes.

The time is upon us when, if we are to save our children to the church and the cause of holiness, we must grip them early. How can we do it? I do not know that I can offer a perfect solution. I would suggest that we make the church and the work of God attract-

ive to them. Get down on a level with them, think more along their line, become one of them, get them to God, then put something in their hands to do and keep them busy. We must help them to feel responsibility. I believe that every church that has a Sunday school of any size and a building suitably adapted should have an after service for the children, separate and apart from the regular preaching service. In erecting new buildings we should plan with this feature in mind. The service should be put in charge of one who loves children and understands them. Someone who can sympathize with them and do effective work among them. This service should be conducted in a way to make the children feel it is their service and that they are responsible for its success or failure. A children's choir should be developed, and an orchestra, where it is possible. Do not expect them to have the light and development of Christians older in years and experience.

"But," says one, "we have the Junior League in our church and it is doing good work." Yes, but how does it compare in numbers in attendance to the Sunday school? It should be to the junior church what the midweek prayermeeting is to the regular church. Ten to fifteen attend the Junior League, while a service immediately following the Sunday school with a simplified, illustrated message, enlivened with music and other things for variety, giving them an opportunity to seek salvation at the close, would hold the most of them, if not the entire Sunday school, thus tying them on to the church. This need not interfere with the work of the Junior League, but rather be made a feeder to it.

It is poor ethics to contend that we are not able to finance such a feature and to employ a Junior pastor. I notice we are careful to see that our own souls are fed. We feel that we would die, spiritually, without a pastor, and we provide one. Let us go a little deeper into our pockets for the children's sake. Anything that ought to be done, can be done. You say, we have a fine pastor who is a good preacher, and you will risk him to grip your child. I would ask, Is he doing it? That is the question that should be answered. While he wades through the deep things of God, blessing and feeding your soul, do the children see deep enough into his message to get the truth upon their little hearts and into their immature minds? In other words, can the child in the primary grades grasp the teachings and work of the high school and college sufficiently to become interested in it?

Our pastors usually deliver their evangelistic messages at night. The child is often at home, busy with its school work, or if present at church, its mind is tired out from play, and it falls asleep or becomes stupid and does not get the message. O, beloved, why toil on through the long, weary night with our nets on the wrong side of the boat? Cast the net on the other side and see if it will not bring results! Let us de-

vote more time and money to the saving of our children. Save an old man and you have saved a soul. Save a child and you have saved a soul plus a life.

#### Latest from China



A cable message dated May 7th, Tientsin, China, is the very latest from our missionaries. It stated that Rev. and Mrs. Smith, with their children, together with the Misses Hayne, Himes, Sims and Vieg would be leaving for the homeland in "a few days" and possibly it might be deemed wise to have the Misses Needles and Pan-

nell with one or two others return with them, if absolutely necessary.

However, the Executive Committee of the Department of Foreign Missions has cabled arrangements which will properly care for all of our interests. If conditions which now seem to be more favorable, shall within a short time permit, we will have sufficient organized missionaries left at Tientsin to return to Taimingfu and superintend the work. If the disturbed conditions remain as they are, our Executive Committee composed of Revs. Deale, Osborn and Dr. West; with their headquarters at Tientsin, can direct the work by having competent Chinese leaders come from our field to the Executive Committee Headquarters for conferences. Thus they would be able not only to instruct them about continuing the mission, hospital, school and training institute, but will also be able to encourage and inspire our Chinese leaders and they returning to the field would increase the revival fires to burn hotter and higher and spread farther.

As never before are we brought face to face with the absolute importance of having a sufficient force of school trained and spiritualized native workers. Dear reader, what would become of our missions, schools, training and hospital work right now if it were not for the fact our representatives (the missionaries) had not against great and serious difficulties persisted in not only the Chinese being regenerated and sanctified, but educated and trained as far as possible with our limited resources. Indeed, our investments, the efforts and sacrifices of the missionaries would have undoubtedly been in vain and our work lost but because we have these native (Chinese) workers all of the departments of our splendid begun work in China are continuing.

Yes, my fellow Nazarenes and friends, now as never before we see the absolute necessity of the native worker. Not for a moment must we even entertain the tempting thought of dropping our offerings for the support of the native workers. Now, please do not cut down the amount or hold back your money, for we need it and we need it now and will continue to

need all of it and as much more as you may feel God would have you send. Oh, please my dear reader, continue or begin now to forward your offerings for the native workers and the other interests of the General Budget to your local church treasurer, who will remit direct and continually to our General Treasurer, Mr. M. Lunn:

May God bless you for helping us in the past and for what you purpose to do in the future toward supporting the native workers and the other interests in the General Budget.

In some such way we all should promptly respond to the plan of the Church for the extension of Ministerial Relief to the disabled veterans of the salvation war. Come on, all preacher-soldiers of the Cross, contribute your small share for the care of the men and women who have preached away their productive days and are now helpless.

The Department of Ministerial Relief has arranged to receive and hold in trust in the interest of any superannuated, retired or wornout or permanently disabled ministers or lay missionaries, or the widows and orphans of deceased ministers or missionaries, any real or personal property, looking after the same for them when they are unable to do so themselves with safety and to advantage. This Department will make investments of such funds, carefully paying to the parties concerned the proceeds of the investments year by year. This will save them from the worry and fear of loss and will guard their small savings for them and see that they get the largest possible returns from them. In rendering this service, the Department will give full information concerning this feature of the work upon receipt of letter requesting such information. The Department is anxious to care for the veteran ministers and their widows.

PART TWO. THE VISION OF OUR LORD

Jesus the Sinner's Refuge as Pictured in the Cities of

Refuge

"The Lord also will be a refuge for the oppressed, a refuge in times of trouble" (Psa. 9:9).

"The eternal God is thy refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms" (Deut. 33:27).

The cities of refuge are types of Jesus sheltering the sinner from the judgment and wrath of God. The fact that God is our refuge is a blessed truth frequently mentioned in the Scriptures. Beautiful examples are: Psa. 14:6; 46:1; 62:7, 8; 71:7; 91:2, 9; 94:22, 142:5 and many others. The word most frequently translated refuge is also rendered a place of refuge, hope, shelter and trust. The Revised renders "refuge" in some places, "high tower." The chief idea is a place of safety. We who have fled for refuge have a hope as an anchor for our soul, even Jesus (Heb. 6:18-20).

The Cities of Refuge. From remote times in the East, if a man killed another the duty of avenging his blood was laid as a sacred trust upon the nearest kinsman. To prevent the injustice of the unintentional slayer of a man being killed, six cities of Refuge were appointed by Moses. There were three on each side of the Jordan, placed where they were of easy approach. Unobstructed highways were maintained to the gates of each. If a man got within the walls of one of these cities after he had slain a man accidentally he was safe as long as he remained inside. On the death of the high priest he was free to return home in safety. The regulations concerning the Cities of Refuge are found in Num. 35, Deut. 19 and Josh. 20. Everything was made plain, simple and easy. If a man slew another unwittingly it was a wise thing for him to exercise all his energy to reach the place of safety before he was overtaken by the avenger. All delay was foolish.

Let us picture two men felling trees near Jerusalem. There had been no difficulty between them. The head of the ax flies off the handle as one of the workmen is busy and his neighbor is slain. He has pressing business at home and wishes to delay until he is able to perform it. He is half decided to risk the delay for he will not be able to return soon. Kind friends warn him to go at once for safety. He learns that the news has been taken to the avenger and asks what is the nearest City of Refuge. On learning that it is Hebron he starts out south. There is no time to stop or rest. The way is long and he is becoming weary, but on looking behind him as he rounds a hill he sees the avenger. Now he is becoming furious for it is a question whether he will be able to reach the place of shelter. On, on he goes hardly daring to look back knowing the enemy is gaining on him. His blood is hot and his muscles are trembling but a glimpse of the drawn sword in the sunlight just behind spurs him to do all he possibly can to escape. The threats and cursings of the enemy are heard now; he is ready to give up but he sees the City of Refuge a little distance away and determines to try again. Nearer and nearer comes the avenger, he can almost feel the hot breath of his panting enemy. If the foe gains a few more steps all is lost. He makes a desperate effortone more step is lost and the avenger's sword is lifted to smite him, but he falls into the arms of the elders at the gate of the city. They close him inside the city safe—a narrow escape.

This is the hour of hope, it will soon be cut off. Then eternal night, eternal woe, eternal torment will be the sad doom of

## THE DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

EFORE we enter into a discussion of the details of a Vacation Bible School we wish to define just what is meant by such a School. A Vacation Bible School is a group of boys and girls meeting each week-day, except Saturday, for several weeks in the summer vacation period. The school opens at nine or nine-thirty in the morning and continues in session with a varied program until about eleventhirty or twelve o'clock. It is neither like a Sunday school nor a public school. It is held during vacation time and the school is conducted on principles that will bring pleasure and enjoyment as well as instruction. The purpose of the Daily Vacation Bible School is to develop Christian character. It stresses various modes of right thinking and doing and sends the children home with a spirit of charity and service. The Vacation Bible School was organized to help solve the problcm of the boys and girls during the vacation period.

In the midst of the wickedness and vice of today it is not difficult for any serious thinking man or woman to see the need of such a school. The old adage, "An idle mind is the devil's workshop," is still true today and one of the great problems for parents to solve, during the vacation period, is to find sufficient things to engage the minds of the children. Boys and girls are charged and seemingly surcharged with energy and activity. That energy calls for an outlet and the child will find one somewhere and some place regardless of the condition into which it plunges itself. How much better that the church help provide for it. We are not only working for today and the amusement of the child for the present but in the joy that the child has during the vacation period should be included a helpful and beneficial program of work. This is done in and through the Daily Vacation Rible School.

The Daily Vacation Bible School is of value not only as a means of religious education or of active service to the community in that it provides an interesting and character building program, but it is also a means of helping solve the juvenile delinquency in the community. Every church and Sunday school worker, along with the parents, need a greater and larger vision of the importance of preserving the child

and the youth from the clutches and snares of the devil. According to the vision of the value of childhood will be the size and character of the church in the generation to come. On an average the Protestant children are receiving only 52 hours of religious education a year. Is this enough? Also in the ranks of the holiness churches, it is appalling the ignorance of Bible and biblical truths that is found. The Daily Vacation Bible School provides a grand opportunity to overcome this as it is equivalent, in the work accomplished, to a whole year of Sunday school work. The child is, generally speaking, the means of an open door into the home and the church has found many open homes as the result of the child or children attending the Vacation Bible School. Another point of value is that of providing opportunities for service for the Lord. If there is a Vacation Bible School, there will have to be workers to man it and here is a wonderful opportunity of using young people to assist in the carrying on the school. This will enlarge the vision of the ones who work, will bring them a taste of the pleasure arising from the service to others; it will discover and help train leaders for the Sunday school, the Young People's Society and the church. Also the School will supplement the work of the entire church and will serve as a means of advertising the church and of presenting its practical work to the people of the community.

The means of promoting a Daily Vacation Bible School are very few and simple. The first requisite is for someone to really believe in it and that his church should have one. This is an excellent opportunity for the pastors to get it on their hearts and lead their people in this very profitable work. Some will be indifferent and say "it can't be done," but if one person will get it on his heart and mind, and with prayer, work at the job, he can have a school. In the majority of the Nazarenes churches the pastor should take the lead and secure the co-operation of his Sunday school board or church board and then a Vacation Bible School will be assured. Then a time should be set to begin the school. The best time seems to begin a week or two after the public schools are dismissed and continue from four to six weeks, as is thought best. A suitable place should be secured in which to hold the school, generally the church building provides the most suitable place. In case it is not the best, some other building nearby can be secured. Secure the necessary teachers and helpers and arrange some means of instructing them for their work. Also make arrangement, along with other plans, for the necessary finances. These should not be very heavy and can be provided by the local church or Sunday school, or by some individual. If a special worker is secured to superintend the school, this will make the finances quite heavy, but in the majority of our churches this is not a necessity. The school should be advertised for it is not best just to try to confine it to the local church, but make a strong effort to enroll others who are not members of any church. The program should be arranged and all necessary material arranged for before the school opens so that there will be no delay. Also plans should be laid before the school opens, to conserve the work of the school after it closes. Get the names and addresses of the new children and turn them over to the pastor or Sunday school worker so that they may visit the home and endeavor to enroll them in the Sunday school and church.

In the conducting of the Daily Vacation Bible School we will notice two important divisions, the organization and the program. There should be one or more meetings, preceding the opening of the school, of all workers, in order to organize for the work. Definite responsibility should be delegated to the various workers. A principal should be arranged for—often it will be the pastor,—who should have complete supervision over all the school. Also a secretary should be secured and instructed in his particular duties. A pianist and a music leader are very essential to the success of the Bible School, as without good music the school will be a failure. The other officers necessary will be regulated according to the size and work that the school does. Most of all there should be suf-

ficient organization to carry the school forward without any delay or confusion.

Those that have the supervision of the Vacation Bible School should meet several weeks before the school is to open and plan out the regular Daily Program for the school. This should be adapted to the size of the school, to the number and experience of the teachers. There is no set formula for a daily program but there are a number of things that should be included in every school. One thing that is absolutely necessary for the success and welfare of the school is that good discipline be maintained throughout. The child does not care for any institution or person who does not expect and require obedience. One of the best means of securing good discipline is to have a definite program that will consume all the time. Every Vacation Bible School should be opened with a devotional period in which the girls and the boys enter actively into the spirit of worship. This is a grand opportunity to have the scholars learn the old hymns of the church and sing them from memory; and also to have them recite the Scripture lesson from memory. Another excellent means of keeping the interest in the school is to have the children make a voluntary contribution for missions each day, which can be used for some specific missionary interest. The other portions of the program that can be arranged and adjusted are: memory work; the story period, in which both biblical and habit stories are brought forth and told in such a way as to leave a lasting impression; music that is not only sung but also carried on in such a way as to bring out the proper interpretation and spirit. One of the departments that can be used to build great interest is the hand-work or crafts department, in which different phases of work can be carried out with the boys and girls. Something definite in the fine of sewing can be planned with the view of sending it to the rescue home at Pilot Point, or to some of our mission stations. Plasticine can be used for the smaller children to have them mold Bible stories. Various articles of woodwork can be planned, for the boys, to bring our biblical scenes or to make something that would furnish material for use in the Sunday school and church. Then some point of citizenship may be brought out to the pupils just before the closing period. Then everybody should be trained to see that his material and work are placed in places arranged for such. The closing exercises should be varied, interesting, orderly and dignified thus leaving a good impression for the child to take home with him.

Many other points of interest might be brought out bearing on the different phases of the Daily Vacation Bible School but sufficient to say that all of the work of the school presents a wonderful opportunity and challenge to the church in regard to the child life. Will we meet it, and build character for God and holiness?

Their crowds have entirely outgrown their They have not more than half church. enough room for their large and growing Sunday school. We did well here with our Gospel Tent Association work. After service we drove back to Ft. Wayne and on Tuesday we made a run to Elkhart, Ind. The Rev. I. P. Moore is our splendid pastor in Elkhart and he has built a beautiful church. I suppose it will seat five or six hundred people but it was entirely too small for our great crowd. Brother Moore has done a wonderful work in Elkhart. His work in that city is almost a miracle and we did unusually well there with our Tent Association. They simply gave us hundreds of dollars for our gospel tents and they shouted for the privilege. From Elkhart we made a run to South Bend. Here the Rev. W. F. Collar is one of the great pastors of our denomination. Less than two years ago it was thought that the work would have to be closed up. Brother Collar got the burden for South Bend and moved on to the ground; now he has a church that will seat five or six hundred people and between four and five hundred in Sunday school. His church has made the greatest growth of any church in our connection in the same length of time. With nearly two hundred members now he will have to soon enlarge his big church. They gave us a great subscription list to our Gospel Tent Association. From South Bend we made a run to Hammond. Here the Rev. E. E. Turner and wife are our fine pastors. We have a splendid church in Hammond in the heart of the city, and here we have nearly two hundred members and between four and five hundred in Sunday school. We have no finer pastors on earth than Brother and Sister Turner and the Hammond church gave us a large subscription list. In Ft. Wayne and South Bend and Hammond the membership to the Gospel Tent Association was almost a tie. These three great churches gave between \$3500 and \$4000 to the Gospel Tent Association. # Sunday School Lesson

May 29

LESSON SUBJECT: Peter Undaunted by Persecution.

LESSON TEXT: Acts 5:27-35, 38-42.
GOLDEN TEXT: We ought to obey God
rather than men (Acts 5:29).

T takes courage to meet opposition and those who hold to great ideals and whose hearts are filled with an ardent desire to see those ideals placed before the people, and who are serious in believing that the world will be benefited just in proportion as the truths they hold become known to the world and embraced by the people, must expect to suffer for their fervency of spirit while promulgating the truth.

But what a blessing to humanity such men and women of undaunted courage have been. Luther must needs go to Worms though the devils were as thick as tiles on a roof, Livingstone must die in Africa in order to give the sons of Ham their blood bought inheritance. Judson must know the torture of the Burmese prison, May Morrill and Anna Gould must go to the executioner's block for China, Slave shackles have been broken, new continents have been discovered, hostile peoples have been subdued, but only those of undaunted courage who have purposed in their hearts to go through have led the van in every triumphant movement.

The Peter of the judgment hall is the Peter of this lesson but since he has received "the power of the Holy Ghost coming upon him" he feels no more the cringing spirit of fear, but the mighty courage of the martyr that dares to say in the language of our Golden Text "We ought to obey God rather than men" and with burning words brands the men of that council the murderers they were, They were speaking the truth when they said you "intend to bring this man's blood upon us." They fully intended to make them feel their guilt, for had they not said, "His blood be upon us and upon our children"? They could not speak the truth and place the responsibility anywhere else. It takes courage to place re-sponsibility where it belongs but God will furnish the courage if He can find a Peter who will be faithful in giving the message. It is the truth that hurts and these guilty Jews were cut to the heart and wanted to slay them. They were still murderers at heart. Devilish animosity against these apostles of Jesus jurked like a foul beast of prey in their hearts and they were ready to pounce upon their victims and show them no

It is true that times have changed and imprisonment and death do not accompany witnessing for Jesus except in rare instances. But nevertheless there is much opposition to Christian truth and it takes courage and real strength of character to stand for the old landmarks and speak out clearly against the spirit of this age. Sound teachers and leaders everywhere are greatly alarmed over the loose spirit

prevalent in our present generation. Consider the travesty on music called "jazz," also the modern type of recreation and amusement. Consider also the carelessness in dress, in conversation, disrespect for authority, contempt for the ideals of proper modesty and decency which were held not longer than twenty years ago.

Dr. Stuart McGuire of Richmond, Va., addressing a session of the California Medical Association Convention held at Los Angeles recently, said some very plain things regarding present day conditions. The keynote of his address was that modesty and prudence among women was fading before the barrage of widely circulated sex magazines and universal suffrage. He said, "Women have already lost prudence, let them beware lest they lose modesty as well." The spirit of this age is Satan's method of opposing Christ in His work of redemption. Our religious beliefs are no longer right or wrong according as the Bible teaches but according to the artful teaching of men who are noted for their acuteness of intellect. This is no time to mince matters but to meet this modern opposition to our Lord with the courage and boldness of Peter, being filled with the mighty power of the Holy Ghost. As ministers and teachers we should be sanctified wholly, to a man, so as to present a solid phalanx against the combined powers of earth and hell.

We notice here that Peter preached to this council a Christ who could and would give repentance and forgiveness of sins to even His murderers. It was not their intention to stir up insurrection but to lead these rulers of the nation to see their guilt and repent. We are impressed with the tact of Gamaliel in his advice. surely as a great teacher and politician he is deserving of much commendation. This man was the teacher of St. Paul and his management of this affair reminds us of the tact used by his illustrious pupil upon many occasions, when he was before Roman rulers to answer charges made against him by the Jews. The imprint of the teacher is left on the character of the pupil.

We are taught in this lesson how God can turn our difficulties into victories. If they had not been imprisoned Peter probably would not have had an opportunity to preach to the rulers and the rulers by their action outwitted themselves and did unconsciously exactly opposite to their plans. Then Gamaliel's address reveals God's controlling hand even in the presence of their enemies. David sang, "Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies," and Daniel found a secure retreat for a night of communion with God and safe ledgings from the infuriated enemies who sought to do him harm during the night hours that he spent with those shaggy, God-controlled beasts. Ah, God has a way of taking care of His own,

We note in closing that neither threats nor beatings could hush these men. They bore their shameful treatment for the Master in the same spirit that the Master had borne His shameful treatment for them. They rejoiced that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for His name and went on with their noble work as before.

Let us remember when we are misunderstood and persecuted that the world has never regarded the Bible standard of religion otherwise than fanatical and it is our business "to obey God rather than men."

Pastor Mathisen has accepted the financial secretaryship of Jamestown Holiness Academy. Rev. Lyman Smith of Mt. Pleasant church has been extended a unanimous call to Fergus Falls for the coming year. We were at Clarkfield, Minn., for a few days and helped push the battle there, looking forward to an organization. Rev. A. A. Sorensen, who is coming to us from the Presbyterian church, ably assisted us at Clarkfield. He is a fine sanctified young man who is already much beloved in and around Clarkfield. He will continue to labor in this field. We expect to return to Clarkfield later to organize a church. During our stay there it rained heavily every day and the roads were impassable. This greatly interfered with the attendance, so it seemed best to postpone the organization until a little later. Pastor Sorensen will labor in and around Clarkfield, Granite Falls, Cottonwood and Echo, and we believe he will be used of the Lord to foster the interests of the kingdom and build up our work.

We made a flying trip to North St. Paul and found Pastor Schaap and his

people well housed in their new, commodious, substantial brick church. They have recalled Pastor Schaap for his fifth year. Pastor and people are united and going ahead. From here we went to Taylor's Falls, Minn. Pastor Kinzler is loyally standing by and pushing the battle. He was invited to remain as pastor for next year. # NEWS FROM EASTERN NAZA-RENE COLLEGE

There are many good things to report for Eastern Nazarene Colege. Our year thus far has in every way exceeded any previous session in our history. We began in Sertember with new buildings and new equipment representing the substantial sum of \$60,000. As an appropriate complement to this, our registration has exceeded any previous number by nearly thirty-five per cent, bringing the total to just below two hundred. Financially, while there are many pressing needs, yet the report of our treasurer to our several Assemblies indicates that we are on a surer footing than ever before. Our spiritual life has been again quickened. Not only do we feel that God is blessing us, but the constant stream of visitors who attend our services commend the beautiful atmosphere of faith and Christian piety to be found on the campus.

It has just been our privilege to entertain the New England Assembly. Everyone seemed to be overjoyed at the growth of our College, and it was apparent that no reasonable request from the College would be denied by this splendid group of Nazarenes. Our other Assemblies are coming along to our support splendidly. We feel confident that the remaining portion of the \$60,000 Debt-Eliminating Campaign, all of which is due November 1 of next year, will be paid. We hope that most of it will come in on or before the date of the maturity of the pledges. This will give us courage to face the demands of the future. The day is not far distant when another new dormitory will be required, and with it an increase in available space for administrative and teaching purposes. At present, however, we are splendidly housed and prepared to accommodate another increase of thirty per cent next year.

The student body has presented to their Alma Mater a splendid new gymnasium which is now in the process of erection. This excellent building will have a floor surface of fifty by ninety-five feet, adequate for every proper physical exercise and afforiding room for co-operative games. We hope another year to have systematic physical training classes, as well as enthusiastic team organizations within our departments. Under the consideration that this gymnasium shall be available as an auditorium, the District voted a substantial sum of money already in hand to supplement the gift of the students. Only \$2,000 remains to be

pledged before the entire amount required is provided.

Our great Commencement season is almost upon us, beginning June 11 and continuing through Wednesday, June 15. Our schedule will include one great succession of exercises and programs, culminating in the Commencement address on Wednesday evening. It is with great pleasure that we announce that Rev. L. A. Reed, A. M., of Long Beach, Calif., formerly vice-president of Pasadena College and professor of biology, will deliver the address. He will also preach the annual sermon on Sunday night, and deliver two other addresses during the period. We are anticipating the visit of many friends and are assured that the closing of this year will be a fitting climax to the unparalleled months which have preceded it.

We are receiving many inquiries from prospective students and shall be glad to furnish literature and information to any who are contemplating availing themselves of the rare opportunities for Christian education afforded by Eastern Nazarene
