A PROPER PREPARATION FOR THE MINISTRY

The remarkable success of James Caughey, the humble Methodist preacher, who in one trip through England saw 100,000 people converted and 20,000 sanctified, is an illustration of what God can do with those who yield themselves unreservedly to Him. There were two things which Mr. Caughey regarded as fundamental to success in the ministry -(1) the necessity for the immediate influence of the Holy Ghost, (2) the necessity for a style of preaching and a class of truth adapted to awaken sinners and bring them to God.

Of the first Mr. Caughey says, "On the evening of that never-to-be-forgotten day I took my pen and wrote: 1st. I see, I feel now as I have never felt before, the absolute necessity of the immediate influence of the Holy Ghost to impart point, efficacy and success to a preached gospel. 2nd. The absolute necessity of praying more frequently, more perserveringly and more believingly for the aid of the Holy Spirit in my ministry. 3rd. That my labors without that aid will be comfortless and valueless; a cloud without water, a tree without fruit, a sound uncertain, unctionless and meaninglesssuch will be the character of my ministry. It is the Spirit of God alone which imparts significance and power to the word preach-ed without which, as one has expressed it, 'all the threatenings of the Bible will be no more than thunder to the deaf or lightning The entire glory of all my sucto the blind'. cess shall henceforth be given to the Holy Spirit. By this I shall as conscientiously abide as by any other principle of our holy religion. It is written, "Them that honor me I will honor.' To this may be added that righteous and unchangable determination of Jehovah, 'My glory will I not give to another.

Mr. Caughey also saw the great importance of a proper preparation for the ministry. He saw that if the Holy Ghost was to act upon the hearts of men it must through the medium of the truth, and that he must give himself to diligently searching for that class of truth which the Spirit could use in awakening and bringing men to God. His oft-repeated words were, "God will never do for his most favored instruments, what they can do for them-The manner in which he prepared selves" himself for his work is told in his words to a brother minister and will prove helpful to young preachers.

I now saw the necessity of turning my attention to that style of preaching which would be likely to awaken sinners and bring penitents to God. Revival artillery I re-solved to have. I fasted and prayed and searched the Scriptures. My reading, thinking, conversation and all my observations were laid under one contribution to one end -preparation for soul-saving which I now perceived to be the great end of the gospel When a text presented itself as ministry. suitable for a revival, my cry was, 'Lord God, open the eyes of my understanding. Give me a clear perception of the meaning in this passage.'

"A forenoon was generally spent on my knees in pleading for divisions and subdivisions. Having completed my skeleton I returned to my knees and pleaded for an introduction and that flesh and blood might come on these dry bones; and the pleading was not in vain. Thoughts of a moving character would come into my mind in troops. Having finished the rough outline it was folded up till the next day. On the morrow I returned to my knees and read the subject over. The Holy Scriptures were then called in to prove or illustrate the sentiments. Commentaries were referred to and lastly my private journal and common place book and then it was consecrated to God and labeled, 'Revival Sermon for Fu-Lord prepared Mr. Caughey, and he will prepare everyone for a fruitful ministry who seeks this preparation with the same diligence.

CHRISTMAS CONVENTION AT ONTARIO

JERUSALEM

N. B. Herrell. Jerusalem, the city of the great King, has held a prominent place in sacred history since the days of Melchisedic, King of Salem, MatoR ALTS 1

(or Jerusalem). There Abraham worshipped the true and living God, paying tithes of all, and there too, was the scene of the offering of Isaac a type of Jesus.

Since those ancient days, Jerusalem has been proclaimed by the prophets; sung by the poets; besieged by enemies; protected by Jehovah; laid waste by famine; rebuilt with power and glory. Good and bad kings have lived within her walls; Solomon's temple was built there; David lived there; Jesus wept over it; the Jews rejected and crucified their King there; the Holy Ghost fell on the church there; the first great revival the world saw was there. Jerusalem was the birthplace of the Christian church and was the headquarters of the church for many years. The Turks have held the sacred city for nearly 1200 years. December 10, 1917, it fell into the hands of the English. Just what this means in the way of prophecy will develop. The question which confronts us is, "Will we go up at once and possess the land?" Should we not have a strong Pentecostal Nazarene Mission well located in this the hirthplace of our beloved Zion? A few thousand dollars in the hands of our Forcign Missionary Board will make it pos sible. The Jerusalem Missionary fund of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene should grow fast. So that by the time the war is over we may be able to enter the field with a strong band of workers.

Jerusalem would be the appropriate place for our Eastern headquarters, for all the European countries will be open for full salvation evangelization. No doubt this city will become a great world center again, as Palestine will soon be alive with Jews returning to their native country.

There is a work to be done among this people, as well as all other nations. We, as a church, are sent to all nations. We are to have faith to do all that we are commissioned to do; we are to plan as large as our commission is; we are to undertake and God is to furnish all power in Heaven and earth to carry on the enterprise.

Shall we go up and possess the land? Shall the redeemed of the Lord go up to Zion with joy and singing? Let the redeemed of the Lord say so Amen!

Matt. 5, 6, 7.

The sermon on the mount follows closely which would open the works of mercy men's hearts to receive the Saviour's words. The preacher was the Lord Jesus,-the greatest of all preachers. The place was a mountain in Galilee. His audience were his disciples. But although the discourse was directed mainly to the disciples, it was in the hearing of the multitude. (Ch. 7-28). The fame of his miracles brought a great crowd of people together and he took advantage of the opportunity to instruct them.

The sermon was about the kingdom of God,-its subjects and its righteousness. It is a discourse about the changed life,showing its conditions and about the kingdom,-showing its nature, legislation and privileges. In regard to heathenism it is a contrast; in regard to the Jewish law, it is a fulfillment. Instead of curses there are blessings, instead of penalties, reward.

I. Christ begins his sermon with a description of the subjects of the kingdom. (5:3-16). First, he gives the qualities of character essential to happiness and influence. He begins with a promise of happiness, with a blessing rather than a curse. He thus connects his program directly with the hopes of his hearers, for the central features in the current Messianic conception were deliverance and happiness. The conditions of happiness were in contrast with those in popular thought. Happiness does not consist in what one possesses, etc., but in the wealth of the inner life, in moral thought, self-control, spiritual insight, and in the character one is able to form within himse'f, and in the service he is able to render to his fellow-men.

The word "blessed" means happy or joyful. The conditions of happiness as given by Christ are:-

1. Poor in spirit.

2 They that mourn.

The meek. 3.

4. They which hunger and thirst after righteousness.

5: The mericful.

The pure in heart. 6.

The peace-makers. They which are persecuted for righteousness sake.

We must not forget the promises accom-panying these conditions. They that mourn are happy because they shall be comforted; the meek are happy because they shall inherit the earth; they which hunger and thirst because they shall be filled.

Christ next uses two beautiful figures to show the responsibility of influence of the subjects of the kingdom. Their mission is the hope of the kingdom. The salt is a figure of our silent influence. A large part of our influence is unconscious and intangible. Salt (1) preserves from corruption; (2) gives taste to all that is insipid; (3) is essential to all organized life. So the disciples alone can save the world from corruption, the Gospel alone can give zest and meaning to society, it is essential to the life of the world.

But our silent influence is not enough. We are to let our lights so shine before men, that they may see our good work and glorify our Father in heaven. Our influence for God must be as far reaching and useful to men as the beautiful light.

II. The relation of the new righteousness to the Mosaic Law. (5:17-18).

1. The relation defined as that of continuance in a higher fulfillment. (17-20)

It must not aim at a lower standard than the law, because instead of abrogating that law, Christ came to fulfill it. Also it must surpass the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, and their righteousness was most scrupu'ous and exacting-above everything else, the righteousness of the kingdom must spring from the heart and control the secret motives of the soul.

2. The higher fulfillment of the new righteousness illustrated by a comparision of its principles with the Mosaic law as currently taught and practiced. (Vs. 21-48).

(1)The higher law of brotherhood judges ill-will as murder. (21-26).

(2) The higher law of purity condemns lust as adultery.

(3) The higher law of truth forbids oaths as unnecessary and evil.

(4) The higher law of rights substitutes self-restraint and generosity for retaliations and resistance.

(5) The higher law of love demands universal good will of a supernatural quality like that of the Father's.

Jesus does not abrogate any law but interprets its precepts in terms that call for a deeper and more perfect fulfillment.

The last verse of the fifth chapter is a "Be summary of the entire chapter. therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect."

III. The new righteousness. Its motives as applied to religious, practical and social duties, or (6:1-7:12). or the principles of conduct.

1. Reverance toward the Father essential in all acts of worship.

(1) In almsgiving.

(2) In prayer.

(3) In fasting.

Christ warns his disciples against the sin of hypocrisy which the Scribes and Pharisees were guilty of. We must not seek after vain glory, but must do our alms, etc., with a humble spirit.

In regard to prayer Christ teaches that private devotions are more profitable than public devotions. The Pharisees were accustomed to pray in the market places, in order to receive the praise of men. This was the only reward they had. But we have a greater reward, from our heavenly Father, to whom all prayer is to be made,-What 2 as Christ taught his disciples. beautiful picture it is,-Christ teaching his lately called disciples the ways of Salvation, warning them of the evils of the day, and giving them practical talks for their daily After Christ had told the disciples life. how not to pray he teaches them how to pray, giving them a model, because we know not what to pray for as we ought, but he helps our infirmities by putting words into our mouths. Matthew Henry says, "the Lords prayer is a letter sent from earth to heaven,". "Our Father" is the inearth to heaven,". scription, "in heaven" is the place; the con-tents, are the several requests; "this day" is the date. There are three parts of the prayer. (1) the preface—"Our Father which art in heaven. (2) The petitions— There are six of these; the first three relate more immediately to God and his hon-In brief these petitions are:or.

Hallowed be thy name.

Thy kingdom come.

3. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

4. Give us this day our daily bread. 5. Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors.

6. Lead us not into tempation, but deliver us from evil.

Conclusion-"For thine is the kingdom. and the power, and the glory, forever, Amen.

"Ascribing glory to God forever mates an acknowledgement that it is eternally due, and an earnest desire to be eternally doing it with angels and saints above."-Henry.

To all this we are taught to affix our Amen, so it be. God's Amen is a grant,it shall be so; our Amen is only a summary desire,-let it be so, it is in token of our desire and assurance to be heard that we say Amen.

We now go to the next sub-division.

2. Loyalty toward the Father fundamental in all activities. (6:19-34).

(1) In treasure seeking.

(2) In trustful devotion to the kingdom and the Father's righteousness. (1) Christ does not design to deprive us of our treasure, but to direct us in the choice of it. We should not place our happiness in temporal things, but in spiritual things. We must not confide in earthly things in time to come, but we must lay up for ourselves treasures in heaven. (2) God wants us to trust Him. Anxious care about the things in this life show that we have our treasures laid up on earth. True faith trusts the Father for the present life as well as for the life to come. If we are not trusting him now for the things that are present and real. what evidence have we that we are really trusting Him for the things that are unseen? God gives us the tests and trials of the present life to prove that He is real to us, and that our faith does take Him for help in time of need. Righteousness is not merely doing our duty to our fellowmen, or having an eye single to the glory of God, but the very root and principle of it is a confidence so simple and complete that like the sparrows of the fields, we can leave all our interests in His hand and trust Him for the life that now is, as well as for the life that is to come.

The next subdivision is:-

3. Love toward the Father dynamic in all social relations. (7:1-12).

(1) Critical estimate of self instead of censorius judgment of others. (1:5).

(2) Discrimination is the communication of spiritual values. (Ver. 6).

(3) Kindness towards others in all things like the Father's kindness toward all His children. (7-12).

Judge not has no reference to conclusions or opinions based on fair investigation or clear evidence; but this has reference entirely to harsh criticism of others based on surmises or ill-will. It is a common condition for persons without ridding themselves of their sin to be swift in condemning others who are guilty of the same sin. Jesus warns us and rebukes us for such hypocrisy.

IV. Hortatory conclusion. (7:13-27)

2 The two gates and the two ways. (13-14). 2. The tests of character. (15-27).

(1) In the conclusion Jesus tells his disciples that the way into the kingdom is a narrow way. The way to all worthy achievement is the narrow way of self-control, self-sacrifice and infinite pains. Such is the way to the righteousness of the kingdom, the supreme object of human endeavor.

(2) By their fruits alone the subjects of the kingdom are known. In the presence of the Father there is no room for those who bring nothing but the leaves of empty professions.

The test of righteousness is illustrated in conclusion; by the parable of the two buildings. Since both the wise man and the foolish man built, it is evident that they both had heard the Word. The difference was that one built on the rock,-Jesus Christ himself, and the other on external profession, which was shifting sand. In the sermon Jesus showed himself to be the Son of God as clearly as when working miracles, for he spoke with the authority as only the Son of God could speak.

SAVED FROM THE CRUEL SWORD

In the begining of the year, 1890, in those terrible cold days, the Turks massacred about 100,000 Armenians. I remember how God saved me from that cruel sword of the Turks, when I was a baby three years old. My father came upon his knees at the family altar, all the children around him, and prayed God that if it was His will to spare our lives, but if we were to be stain that he would keep up true and firm in the faith and give us grace at the hour of bloodshed and suffering to be martyrs for Him, rather than to deny the precious name of Jesus.

After prayer my father planned to go to the American Missionaries for protection. He took me in his arms and went through the snow. We saw people slain and their blood coming down the streets. Then came two terrible Turks with the sword in their hands and we were next to be slain. They raised their sword to strike my father and slay him and myself. My father at once raised up his hand against the sword to protect me, and cried with a loud voice: "For God's sake stop a moment!" They stopped to listen while my father was pray-ing to God and telling them to spare our lives, especially he pleaded for my life. remember I also raised my hand just like my father did and told them to save my father. God touched the hearts of those Turks and one said to the other: "What shall we gain by killing these people like animals, let us pass them by." So they passed on and we went to missionaries building safely. On our way God wonderfully saved our lives from fire and sword and the bullets of the Turkish soldiers. God heard my fathers' prayer and not one of us from the entire family was even hurt, except the Turks burned down our home into ashes

The Sufferings of the Armenians No one can tell the horrors of Turkish atrocity, and no language can describe the 1915 massacre, one of the greatest in the world's history, in which we lost over one million people. During this last bloodshedding the missionary work in general has suffered terribly in Turkey. Many missionaries and native workers and pastors, and many thousands of native Christians have laid down their lives, churches, schools, hospitals and whole stations have been closed and the work stopped. Property taken from Armenia by military or destroyed in deportations, totals millions of dollars. In Tifilis alone, are 2000 Armenian refugee children, whose paren's have been victims of massacre and starvation. Among them is a little girl whose story is as follows: In June 1916, she and her father and mother were driving from their home and sought refuge in their neighboring forest. They were pursued, caught by the Turkish

soldiers, who shot the father and after treating the mother with horrible brutality, wounded her mortally and left her to die The dying mother was able to give her child a message for all Armenians throughout the world. "Tell them," she said, "That I am dying for the sake of Christ, my nonor and my nation, and my blood and the blood of those who have fallen in these massacres will purify Armenia, shake off her bondage and make her a free nation."

An Armenian Testimony

Now I close this brief account with my testimony. I thank God for His grace. It was over three years that I have never heard from my parents in Armenia. Per-haps they have been massacred. Many times I wept and cried for them, but God's grace has been sufficient for me in this great trial. I am glad that I will meet my loved ones in heaven singing songs of Redeeming Love and waving palms of victory. I am glad for salvation. Glory to God! Jesus saved me from my sins 10 years ago in Armenia, then 5 years after he sanctified me Jesus wholly in the Nazarene church at Berkeley, California, and he has kept, me ever since. Through many sorrows, toils and snares, I have already come. It is grace that brought me safe this far and grace will lead me home.

The Lord has also given me a missionary call to my own people. I am looking for the time when God will send me to Armenia to preach Jesus and Him crucified. God has put in my heart such an intense love for lost souls, that I will preach the Gospel to all people, even to the cruel Turks who have massacred my nation and my loved ones; and by the grace of God I will see some of them saved and sanctified. Thank God! He has given me the vision, and I am obedient to the heavenly vision.

The Armenians trace their descent from Haig, the grandson of Japhet. His descendant Aram, is the hero of the nation and by his name the country was called Armenia by the Persians, and Haik or Haiaston by the Armenians. The Armenians first appear in history about the middle of the sixth century B. C., when Dikeau of the Haig dynasty, freed his nation from its subjection to the Assyrians and Medes. Armenia was subdued by Alexander the Great and was ruled by representative kings until 190 B. C. Then the satraps Aetaxias and Zariades revolted against Antiochus the Great and divided the province. The former took the country east of the Euphrates, or Armenia Major, and the latter the western portion or Armenia Minor. The Armenians maintained the kingdom for about 1800 years.

Armenia comes into view in connection with Biblical history in the time of the cap-

tivity of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar and the deportation of the Judean people. The Armenian king, Huradian, was one of the allies in the siege and on return to Armenia carried with him a Hebrew prince named Shampad. He was a very intelligent man and made himself greatly loved and esteemed by the Armenians, a sort of Daniel or Joseph. He married an Armenian noble-woman and his descendants became the very foremost of the noble families and Hence we see that there is noble Hebrew blood in the Armenian nation.

THE ARMENIANS AND CHRISTIANITY

About the year 285 A. D. Christianity was introduced into Armenia by Gregory the Illuminator, who succeeded in converting the king Tiridates III. The old religion, Zoroastrainism, collapsed; the people followed the example of their monarch and became the earliest national Christian Church in the world.

The rulers of Persia persecuted the Armenians and endeavored vainly to extirpate Christianity, plunging the country into anarchy. The first 250 years of Arab rule (63-885) were marked by bitter conflicts between Mohammedans and Byzantines. After this there came ruin by the Mongol iuvas-ions. The Seljuk Turks and after them Timur devastated the land and occupied a portion of it, while the Byzantines seized the rest. Armenia was subjugated by the Persians in 1472, but part of it was wrested from them by the Ottoman Turks fifty years later and permanently incorporated in the empire.

0 THE COLLEGE FARM

The college farm consists of sixty acres just south of the college. Forty acres of this is in alfalfa and twenty acres still unimproved. In this country farms often yield as high as ten tons to the acre in one season and the price has been as high as \$15.00 per ton. It can be readily seen that this farm will provide a valuable endowment for the college as well as provide work for a number of students who otherwise could not attend. The farm will not be a source of income this year but we hope to make it aid us quite materially next year.

NORTHWEST NAZARENE COLLEGE

Location-Northwest Nazarene College is located at Nampa, Idaho, on the Oregon Short Line Railroad.

Aim-To prepare young men and women for efficient leadership in the various forms of Christian activity, both at home and abroad.

Plan-We urge our students whenever practicable, to complete a full college course with major study in the Bible and allied subjects. Briefer courses on the institute plan for those not able to complete full college courses.

Departments-Full college and academy courses, Grammar School Commercial Department, Departments of Music and Art.

Faculty-A university trained faculty in college and academy.

Student Body-Student body of 212 members from 11 states and 3 foreign countries. There are ton religious denominations represented. Student Club—The students maintain a boarding club on the co-operative plan. Meals

- Control-The college is controlled by a Board of Directors incorporated under the laws of the State of Idaho.
- Board of Directors-There are twelve members of the Board of Directors, all of whom must be members of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene and in the experience of holiness.
- By-Laws-The By-Laws of the Board of Directors are determined by the Idaho-Oregon District of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene and cannot be altered or amended without a two-thirds majority vote. Property—The property is deeded to the corporation and is valued at \$52,935.00.

Classification-The college meets the requirements which the General Board of Education specifies for a standard college.

Territory—The educational district of the Northwest Nazarene College comprises the Northwest, Idaho-Oregon and Dakotas-Montana Districts, including the States of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Emphasis-(1) Real Christian experience; (2) Thorough scholarship; (3) Development in initiative, co-operation, thoroughness, sympathy and faithfulness.

TEMPORARY ENDOWMENT FUND
