### **COMMENCEMENT NEWS**

To have with us Dr. H. Orton Wiley, first president and president for ten years of N. N. C., and now editor of the Herald of Holliness, on Sunday, May 22 and Monday, May 23, was indeed a pleasure.

Doctor Wiley spoke to a crowded house at First Church on Sunday evening. From Ephesians I: 1-14 came his message. "The epistle," he said, "begins with grace and peace and ends with peace and grace. It deals not with salvation wrought by Christ, but in Him.

The speaker took us through the tabernacle, giving us glimpses of the priest, the golden candlestick, the tribes, and the veil behind the altar of incense.

Rev. L. A. Reed, pastor of Headquarters church, Kansas City, delivered the annual baccalaureate address on Sunday morning, May 29, on the subject, "He is the Same."

Using as a text Hebrews 13:8, he spoke of a pre-existent Christ, of a redeemer, of a humiliated Christ, of a majestic Christ, of a human Christ, of a crucified Christ, a resurrected Christ, and of Christ, the burden-bearer.

More than 400 students and faculty members participated in the processional march. The college seniors followed the faculty to the front seats, and each succeeding class came in its order.

As Brother Reed brought the message, tears flowed freely and it seemed that the bendiction of the Holy Spirit was on the service. In the evening again, the speaker addressed a full house on the subject "Son, Remember." Once more the Spirit descended and many found their way to the altar for salvation and sanctification.

The college senior class gave their program on Monday evening, May 30.

Charles Croft read the Scripture; Dr. Olive M. Winchester, class sponsor, gave the invocation; the senior male quartet sang; Miss Alice Cary, salutatorian, gave the address of welcome; Donald S. Harper, president, gave the class will; Miss Thelma Culver and Ross Price sang.

Rev. Donnell J. Smith, pastor of First Church, Portlard, Ore and secretary of the College Board of Regents, gave the address of the evening the president of the class presented a picture of the members to the school; Miss Willyla Bushne gave a chalk drawing, accompanied ' Paul Thoreen, ho sang, by Charles C oft at the piano and Miss Ruth Witt on the violin; Ross Price, valedictorian, read; the senior chorus sang; and President R. V. DeLorg pronounced the benediction. One hundred and eight students were graduated from the various departments of Northwest Nazarene College on Tuesday evening, May 31. More than 1000 persons witnessed the graduating exercises.

To Ross E. Price, Poplar, Mont., went the honor of being valedictorian of the College senior class of twenty-seven members.

Miss Alice Cary, Yakima, was salutatorian. Miss Hazel Hankins, Emmett, was valedictorian of the Academy seniors and Miss Mary Carr, Yakima, salutatorian. Miss Willyla Bushnell, Eugene, Ore., was the third member of the college senior class to be graduated this year with a summa cum lauda on her diploma.

Reverend Reed announced his subject as "The Modern Economic Expectancy in Relation to the Nazarene Program." He mentioned two handicaps of the modern economic program. "It does not consider man's natural propensities," he said, "and it leaves no place for Christ."

"The task of the church is no tone of reform. Our task is to attack directly the problem of evil, which is responsible for the ills of society. The church seeks an eternal existence which the economic program fails to provide, and he offered a final exhortation to members of the college senior class.

Forty-one students were graduated from our normal department, 28 from Academy, 27 from the College of Liberal Arts, and ten from the Training School.

The Alpha Delta Phi athletic-literary society was winner of the faculty loving cup for literary and sports ability for the second semester. The Sigma Lambda Alpha society was second in the number of points won and the Olympian society third.

It was the track meet and the literary contest that won for the A. D. P.'s. To Robert Howard, Emmett, who won the track meet almost single-handed, went the cup for track honors. His teammate, Chester Fujino, our Japanese boy, took second place.

Glen Nolte, Nampa, and Charles Croft, Connell, Wash., won the second semester's tennis doubles' championship when they defeated Paul Thoreen, Alexandria, Minn., and Robert Mangum, Nampa. Earlier in the week Croft defeated his doubles teammate for the college singles' championship.

Miss Alice Cary, Yakima, Wash., turned the tables of the first semester on Miss Hazel Kjonaas, Starbuck, Minn., to win the women's singles' championship, and this pair annexed the women's doubles' honors.
