Reverend J. A. McNatt, district superintendent of the Idaho-Oregon district, will be the minister for the fall revival at N.N.C. Reverend C. Hastings Smith, previously announced speaker is unable to come because of illness.

Services will begin Monday, November 5 at the regular chapel service which will be held at 11 o'clock. Reverend McNatt will preach each morning at that time and each evening at 7:30. Special music will be in charge of Professor Taylor and Mr. Swann.

Born and educated in Shelbyville, Tennessee, Reverend McNatt served as a First Lieutenant in the infantry in World War I. After his marriage, he pastored at Ibira, Missouri for four years.

Since that time, Reverend Mc-Natt has been in the evangelistic field for 16 years and has preached in 42 states. He accepted the position of district superintendent for this district in May, 1945.
