Tonight Ron Kirkpatrick and Faye Wilson will be featured in the ADP-Oly play, "The Man" by Mel Dinelli. The lead roles for the play were double cast.

In last night's performance, Elmo Hatlestead and Barbara Sandford gave their interpretation of the roles.

Elmo has a masterful use of his eyes in interpreting the part of "the man", Howard Wilton. He reveals Howard as a man who has a hard time in life and who desires to be respected as himself.

Ron's portrayel is done mainly through motions and voice inflection. He plays up Howard's intense concern over little details. He is appreciative of kindness, but suspicious and easily hurt.

Playing opposite Ron, Faye depicts Mrs. Gillis as an emotional woman who is losing control of herself, yet struggling to hang onto her sense of balance.

Barbara's interpretation of Mrs. Gillis is more humorous. She shows Mrs. Gillis as a very sympathetic individual who tries, not too successfully, to hide her good heart.

Eloise Tate as Ruth, Mrs. Gillis' niece, is the only other girl in the play. She interprets Ruth as emotionally and mentally young for her age, unaware of great danger when in the midst of it.

Completing the cast are Roy Harris as Mr. Armstrong, a goodnatured roomer who wants to be helpful, but who is really more of a nuisance; Alan Rodda, whose part of Mr. Franks, changes the whole twist of the play; Tom Nees as Doug, the grocery boy who is worried about Mrs. Gillis but isn't sure what is wrong; and Ray Arnold, whose small part as a telephone repairman, brings on the climax of the play.

Setting for the play is an old Victorian house in the midst of a large, modern city. Action takes place in two rooms simultaneously, but it is synchronized so that it is not distracting to the audience.

Carl Palangi, popular young bass-baritone who will sing Monday evening at 8:00 p.m. o'clock at Northwest Nazarene College auditorium under the auspices of the Nampa Civic Music Association, has been widely acclaimed for his triple starring in opera, concert and television. Known for his regal performance as the Tsar in Boris Godunoff, Mr. Palangi has proved equally successful as actor and singer is such strongly contrasting roles as Don Giovanni. Mephistopheles and Jabez Stone in The Devil and Daniel Webster.

Winner of the San Francisco Music Critics' award, Mr. Palangi has been a featured soloist with the San Diego Philharmonic and other West Coast orchestras. He is a member of the San Francisco Opera Company, the Stanford University Opera, and in radio and television. On his last visit to Europe, Palangi received flattering opera and film offers in France and Italy, but returned to the United States to increase his already extensive repertoire of roles.

Proposed Amendment Submitted

(Editor's note)

This proposed amendment was submitted to the student council and is now being considered by each member.

Each member of the associated students who is of college classification, including the graduate student and the special student, shall be allowed to participate only in any election of the associated students in which a person of college classification is being selected for office in that association, or for some other position of honor in the college such as that of cheerleader or Tip-off Queen.

Each member of the associated students who is of high school classification, shall be allowed to participate only in any election of the Associate Students, in which a person of high school classification is being selected for office in the high school, or for some other position of honor in the high school such as cheer-leader or Tip-off Queen.

An amendment must be passed by the Student Council, the Administrative Council and the student before it can be written into the constitution. Consider this, and other voting matters, carefully and be ready to vote intelligently.

More than a hundred fans came out Monday night to watch the Crusaders meet their first outside competition of the season in a scrimmage game with the Airmen from Mountain Home Air Base.
